

Media talking points

- In February 2018, the Safety Testing and Advisory Service at Festivals and Events (STA-SAFE)
 consortium submitted a proposal to conduct a pill testing trial at a music festival in the ACT.
 STA-SAFE is a consortium of non-government organisations led by Harm Reduction Australia.
- Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the
 contents of drugs and helps patrons avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous
 substances often found in illicit drugs. This service is frequently accompanied by drug
 counselling and brief interventions provided by health professionals.
- ACT Health reconvened the cross directorate Pill Testing Working Group to examine the STA-SAFE proposal, in the context of Groovin the Moo music festival at the University of Canberra on 29 April 2018.
- The working group has undertaken significant consultation with relevant stakeholders including STA-SAFE, the University of Canberra and Cattleyard Promotions, the Groovin the Moo promoter.
- It is important to realise that the pill testing trial would only be successfully implemented with the full support of all the relevant stakeholders.
- With the requirements identified to secure full support of all parties not able to be met, it is unlikely that a pill testing trial will go ahead at Groovin the Moo.
- It is important to be clear that through supporting pill testing the ACT Government is not
 softening its approach to drugs and there are no proposed changes to legislation. It is illegal
 to possess, manufacture and distribute illicit drugs in the ACT.
- The ACT Government also does not approve or condone illicit drug use. Our message to the community will always be that it is dangerous to take illicit drugs.

Pill testing

- Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the
 contents of drugs and helps patrons avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous
 substances often found in illicit drugs.
- Evidence shows limiting the dangers of illicit drug use through services such as pill testing can help to reduce harm at events that drugs are prevalent at.
- Pill testing provides an opportunity for health professionals to give face to face education and advice to young people about the harm and risk of consuming illicit drugs and the potential toxicity of any unknown substances.
- As this health intervention is occurring prior to a young person taking the substance, it could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

Question and Answer

What is pill testing?

Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the contents of drugs and helps patrons to avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous substances often found in illicit drugs.

Service staff test a small sample of the pill, then interpret and provide the results with information about the risks of consuming the substances identified in the sample.

Pill testing facilities have been effectively used internationally since the 1990s and are currently available in approximately 20 countries in Europe, the Americas and New Zealand.

What is harm reduction?

Harm reduction includes measures aimed at reducing the adverse health, social and economic consequences of the use of drugs, for the user, their families and the wider community. Along with demand reduction and supply reduction, harm reduction makes up the three pillars of the balanced harm minimisation approached outlined in the National Drug Strategy 2017-2026.

How are pills tested?

The pill testing services can be conducted by volunteer medical staff and analytical chemists using a mobile laboratory. Patrons asked to undertake a pre-test self-assessment which will ask what they believe the substance is and to then provide a small scraping of the substance onto the test equipment.

After the pill has been tested, the staff provide information regarding the results and discuss the risks of drug taking. Patrons are given an opportunity to discard the illicit substance in the amnesty bin.

The composition of illicit drugs is highly variable and unpredictable. The makers of illicit drugs will frequently cut pills with other substances, or substitute other more dangerous drugs entirely. Drugs may also be produced and distributed in unfavourable environments.

Pill testing enables better risk management by consumers. It helps people make an informed decision on whether or not to take the drug if it is found to be overly potent or contain unexpected substances.

Does pill testing promote or condone drug use?

No- evidence suggests that people don't end up consuming more illicit substances as a result of a pill testing service. Pill testing services are a unique opportunity to effectively encourage people who use illicit drugs to modify their behaviours in ways that reduce risks of harm to their health.

There is no evidence that providing pill testing leads to increased drug dealing, or drug use, at festivals. This is consistent with the high levels of illicit drug use reported in this setting regardless of the presence of pill testing.

When will the ACT Government make a decision going forward about pill testing for upcoming festivals?

Proposals for future pill testing services in the ACT will be assessed on their merits. The working group believes that STA-SAFE have the capability to deliver this service in the future.

Do the Groovin the Moo organisers support pill testing at the festival?

The Government is not able to comment on behalf of the event promoters, who are a private company.

Does the University of Canberra support pill testing at Groovin the Moo?

We understand that the University of Canberra has publically confirmed that they support pill testing at Groovin the Moo, however the government cannot comment on behalf of the University.

Do ACT Policing and ACT Ambulance support pill testing?

ACT Health has worked closely with Justice and Community Safety Directorate (JACS), ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) and ACT Policing through the ACT Government's Working Group. All agencies are supportive of pill testing as a harm minimisation initiative.

Is there community support for pill testing?

ACT Health together with Justice and Community Safety Directorate (JACS), ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) and ACT Policing formed a cross government working group. The working group has undertaken significant consultation that was overwhelmingly in favour of pill testing being allowed to take place in the ACT.

Consultation with the wider Canberra community in the form of a Canberra Omnibus Survey run by Winton Sustainable Research Strategies found nine in ten people (89.8%) say they support a harm reduction approach.

Does pill testing make taking illicit drug use safe?

No. Pill testing services operate on a harm reduction principle. The service will provide you with information on the contents, the risks involved, and how to reduce them. Even with laboratory level testing, service staff never advise users that the drug they are taking is 'safe.'

Also, chemical analysis is also not able to determine with certainty whether a person will have a toxic reaction to taking a pill, although certain contaminants are highly toxic and likely to cause harm if ingested. Illicit drugs such as amphetamines and MDMA are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them.

Are legislative changes needed to allow pill testing to happen in the ACT?

STA-SAFE has not proposed any change to the legislative status of illicit drugs in the ACT. The possession, supply, and use of illicit drugs remains illegal in the ACT. However, pill testing is a method of harm minimisation and aims to keep people safe.

What evidence is available that pill testing actually reduces harm?

Available evidence indicates that providing consumers with information about the content of illegal drugs they intend to ingest can reduce rates of overdose or toxicity from unknown substances.

There is also evidence that pill testing facilitates engagement of festival patrons in counselling. A report from Austria found that half of those who had their drugs tested stated the results affected their consumption choices and two-thirds said they would not consume the drug and would warn friends in case of negative results.

A recent published review of pill testing by an NGO at eight festivals in New Zealand analysed 330 samples. The testing service identified 39 different psychoactive substances. More than 75 per cent

of patrons believed their substance was MDMA or LSD. Only 66 per cent of samples were actually MDMA or LSD, and 38 per cent of samples were not exactly what patrons believed them to be. The NGO reported the impact on patron's behaviour being significant with patrons making more considered and safer decisions. 63 per cent of patrons indicated they did not intend to take the drug when they learnt it was not what was expected.

The available literature does not provide evidence that pill testing prevents deaths among festival patrons. Any such effect would be difficult to study due to the unpredictable nature of adverse events from illicit drug consumption.



Date: Friday 22 September 2017

Media talking points

General

- The ACT Government is allowing pill testing service to be provided at the Spilt Milk Music Festival in November 2017.
- The ACT Government is leading the way in becoming the first Australian jurisdiction to allow pill testing facilities at major music festival.
- The ACT Government is allowing a pill testing service to occur at Spilt Milk as a harm reduction measure to help people make more informed decisions before participating in risky behaviour.
- The safety and wellbeing of our young people and those attending music festivals is the main priority of the Government in allowing pill testing to occur.
- It is important to be clear that the ACT Government is not softening its approach to drugs and there are no proposed changes to legislation. It is illegal to possess, manufacture and distribute illicit drugs in the ACT.
- The ACT Government also does not approve or condone illicit drug use. Our message to the community will always be that it is dangerous to take illicit drugs.
- The pill testing at Spilt Milk will be provided by Safety and Testing & Advisory Service at
 Festivals and Events (STA-SAFE) as part of a broader suits of harm reduction services at the
 festival. STA-SAFE is a consortium of non-government organisations led by Harm Reductions
 Australia.
- STA-SAFE are providing and funding this service as an independent provider. The ACT government is not funding STA-SAFE to provide the service.
- At this time, pill testing will only be allowed to occur at Spilt Milk. Following the festival, the STA-SAFE will evaluate the pill testing service and provide this information to the ACT Government Working Group. The ACT Government will then consider the evaluation and determine if pill testing will be allowed to be provided by an independent provider at future festivals.
- Earlier this year, ACT Health together with Justice and Community Safety Directorate (JACS), ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) and ACT Policing formed the ACT Government's Working Group to examine the STA-SAFE proposal, as well as the broader public health, legal and social issues related to pill testing.
- The working group has undertaken significant consultation with relevant health sector stakeholders and interested local health professionals and there has been overwhelming support to allow pill testing to take place at this festival.

• We have also gained insights on the community's views on pill testing through the Canberra Omnibus Survey, which found nine in ten people (89.8%) say they support a harm reduction approach to pill testing at major festivals.

Pill testing

- Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the
 contents of drugs and helps you avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous substances
 often found in illicit drugs.
- Pill testing will provide an opportunity for health professionals to give face to face education
 and advice to young people about the harm and risk of consuming illicit drugs and the

- To reiterate there is no proposed changes to the legislative status of illicit drugs in the ACT.

Question and Answer for Minister

What is pill testing?

Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the contents of drugs and helps you avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous substances often found in illicit drugs.

Service staff test a small sample of your pill, then interpret and provide the results with information about the risks of consuming the substances identified in the sample.

What is harm reduction?

Harm reduction includes measures aimed at reducing the adverse health, social and economic consequences of the use of drugs, for the user, their families and the wider community. Harm reduction makes up one of the three pillars of the balanced harm minimisation approached outlined in the National Drug Strategy 2017-2026.

How will pills be tested?

The pill testing service will be conducted by volunteer medical staff and analytical chemists using a mobile laboratory. Patrons will be asked to undertake a pre-test self-assessment which will ask what patrons believe the substance is and to then provide a small scraping of the substance onto the test equipment.

After the pill has been tested, the staff will provide patrons with information regarding the results and discuss the risks of drug taking. Patrons will be given an opportunity to discard the illicit substance in the amnesty bin.

The composition of illicit drugs is highly variable and unpredictable. The makers of illicit drugs will frequently cut pills with other substances, or substitute other more dangerous drugs entirely. Drugs may also be produced and distributed in unfavourable environments.

Pill testing enables better risk management by consumers. It helps people make an informed decision on whether or not to take the drug if it is found to contain unexpected substances.

Where will the pill testing services be located?

The STA-SAFE pill testing facility will be located in the medical precinct of the Spilt Milk festival, adjacent to first aid services and the ambulance service. The testing facility will be enclosed to provide privacy for people seeking to have their pills tested, similar to a medical cubicle.

What is an amnesty bin?

Amnesty bins contain bleach, which completely destroy any drugs deposited in them to the extent that they could not be recovered or used. The substances could then be disposed of as standard medical waste.

Who will be doing the pill testing?

Pill testing at the Spilt Milk festival will be provided by the Safety and Testing and Advisory Service at Festivals and Events (STA-SAFE). STA-SAFE is a consortium of non-government organisations lead by Harm Reduction Australia (HRA).

HRA is a national membership based advocacy non-government organisation that supports harm reduction strategies in relation to drug use. The pill testing will be provided using mobile laboratory equipment free of charge as a component of a number of harm reduction services.

STA SAFE will provide all stakeholders with a report of the pill testing service following the event.

The report will include data on:

- Information on the type and quality of services provided.

When will the ACT Government make a decision going forward about pill testing for upcoming festivals?

Proposals for future pill testing services in the ACT will be assessed on their merits, along with the results of the STA-SAFE service from Spilt Milk.

How will pill testing be governed?

Pill testing will be incorporated into the Spilt Milk event risk management plan as a mitigation strategy to reduce harm of illicit drug use for patrons attending.

The STA-SAFE volunteers will work with the event owner, ACT Policing and ACT Ambulance Service to integrate the harm reduction service into the event footprint.

Do the Spilt Milk organisers support this decision?

The electronic music industry have been calling for a pill testing service in Australia for a number of years.

Do ACT Policing and ACT Ambulance support this decision?

ACT Health has worked closely with Justice and Community Safety Directorate (JACS), ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) and ACT Policing through the ACT Government's Working Group.

How much is this costing the ACT Government?

The ACT Government is not funding the pill testing to occur at Spilt Milk. STA-SAFE are providing and funding this service as an independent provider.

If someone ingests a pill deemed safe but dies is the government liable?

No pill will ever be deemed safe by the pill testing service. The STA-SAFE staff will emphasise the message that "all drug use carries an inherent risk" and that "pill testing cannot provide evidence of safety".

The likelihood of a patron having an adverse outcome from illicit drug use is reduced if they accessed the pill testing service as they would be given information on the risks associated with illicit drug use and given an opportunity to discard the pill.

It is also likely that the pre-hospital and hospital treatment would be expedited for a patron that has used a pill testing service and was suffering an adverse event. This is because both paramedics and emergency department physicians would have access to detailed information on what substances the patron had likely ingested.

Do you expect a larger intake of illicit drugs at this festival?

No. Evidence would suggest that people don't end up consuming more illicit substances as a result of a pill testing service. Pill testing services are actually a unique opportunity to effectively encourage people who use illicit drugs to modify their behaviours in ways that reduce risks of harm to their health.

Harm-reduction approaches can be controversial but they represent pragmatic solutions to a range of health needs.

Will extra ambulance services be available?

The ACT Ambulance Service was represented on the cross government working group that considered the STA-SAFE proposal.

ACTAS resources are pre deployed to all major mass gathering events in the ACT as a public safety precaution. The operational requirements for the Spilt Milk event will be determined by ACTAS in conjunction with the event provider.

The working group has undertaken significant consultation that was overwhelmingly in favour of pill testing being allowed to take place in the ACT.

What do you make of the statement made by Premiers in other states who are taking a hard line approach to drug usage and not allowing pill testing to take place?

Harm reduction is a strategy used in medicine and social policy to minimise harm to individuals and/or wider society from hazardous behaviours or practices that cannot be completely avoided or prevented by law enforcement alone.

Focusing on demand and supply reduction through law enforcement is only part of the solution. The National Drug Strategy 2017-2026 advocates a balanced harm minimisation approach including harm

reduction strategies. Pill testing represents a solution to reducing the risk of avoidable death and disability among young people through illicit drug use.

The safety and wellbeing of our young people and those attending music festivals is the main priority of the Government in allowing pill testing to occur.

Will people be arrested if using the pill testing services?

We want to ensure our young people are making more informed decisions about their health and wellbeing before participating in risky behaviour. It will also be one of a number of established harm minimization measures in place at the festival.

ACT Health has worked closely with our law enforcement agencies as part of the Cross Government Working Group where these types of issues have been worked through.

Law enforcement will not interfere with the conduct of pill testing at the Spilt Milk festival. However they will have a strong presence at the festival as part of their usual law enforcement activities at such events.

It is important to be very clear that the possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs remain illegal in the ACT and at the festival.

Allowing pill testing to occur is about providing a health intervention prior to a young person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

Is from illicit drug use common at ACT events?

Adverse health events from the consumption of illicit drugs and alcohol occur commonly at music festivals. Five drug related deaths were reported occurring at Australian music festivals in 2015 with the ages of the deceased ranging from 19-26 years.

Data from the ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) from the 'Groovin' the Moo' festival held in May 2016, shows that of the 30 patients treated on-site by ACTAS during the event, 25 were drug and alcohol related. Eleven patients with drug overdose (including psycho stimulation) were treated by ACTAS at this event.

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Media talking points

SUBJECT: Pill testin

Pill testing trial at Groovin the Moo

ISSUE:

Media interest on pill testing not going ahead at the music festival in April 2018

Talking points:

• The ACT Government is aware of the decision by the promoters of Groovin the Moo (GTM) not to support a pill testing trial at this year's festival.

- This is disappointing. The Government had evaluated the proposal by independent consortium STA-SAFE for the controlled trial to take place and were supportive of it occurring.
- Pill testing at music festivals has never been done in Australia.
- The very clear message from the ACT Government is 'don't do drugs'.
- Pill testing is a harm reduction intervention which offers free analysis of the chemical composition of substances surrendered for testing.
- Allowing pill testing to occur is about providing a health intervention prior to a young person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.
- The ACT Government continues to support a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.
- Should the STA-SAFE consortium present a proposal to conduct a controlled trial at another festival, the ACT Government will again consider the proposal on its merits.
- We would welcome the opportunity to work with other events that would be open to supporting a pill testing trial.

If asked about Cattleyard's requirements:

- The ACT Government evaluated the proposal by independent consortium STA-SAFE for a controlled trial to take place at GTM and determined that a trial was appropriate to occur at that event.
- Through our Cross Government Working Group, we have worked closely with our law enforcement agencies.
- Law enforcement has indicated it will not interfere with the conduct of a pill testing trial. However they would maintain a strong presence at any music festival as part of their usual law enforcement activities at such events.
- It is important to be very clear that the possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs remain illegal in the ACT and at the festival.
- The ACT Government also does not approve or condone illicit drug use. Our message to the community will always be that it is dangerous to take illicit drugs.

• Allowing pill testing to occur is about providing a health intervention prior to a young person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry

- A Parliamentary Committee Inquiry in Victoria investigating laws and regulation of illicit drugs have recently released a report.
- The report proposes authorities, but not festival goers, have access to "back-of-house" testing of substances so they can treat patients and issue alerts to the public to prevent other incidents.

If asked if this proposal is something the ACT Government would consider:

- The ACT Government supports a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.
- Should the STA-SAFE consortium present a proposal to conduct a controlled trial at another festival, the ACT Government will again consider the proposal on its merits.
- We would welcome the opportunity to work with other events that would be open to supporting a pill testing trial.
- The ACT Government is committed to minimising the harms associated with recreational and illicit drug use and will continue to pursue harm reduction measures.

FURTHER BACKGROUND:

- In February 2018, the STA-SAFE consortium submitted a proposal to conduct a pill testing trial at the GTM music festival at the University of Canberra on 29 April 2018.
 - o STA-SAFE is a consortium of non-government organisations led by Harm Reduction Australia.
- ACT Health reconvened the Cross Government Pill Testing Working Group to examine the STA-SAFE proposal.

The ACT Government is aware of the decision by the promoters of Groovin the Moo (GTM)
not to support a pill testing trial at this year's festivalthat pill testing at Groovin the moo will

- This is disappointing. The Government had evaluated the proposal by independent consortium STA-SAFE for the controlled trial to take place. The ACT Government continues to provide a supportive policy environment for a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.
- and were supportive of it occurring.
- Formal Ppill testing at music festivals has never been done in Australia.
- The very clear message from the ACT Government is 'don't do drugs'.
- Pill testing is a harm reduction intervention which offers free analysis of the chemical composition of substances surrendered for testing.
- Allowing pill testing to occur is about providing a health intervention prior to a young-person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.
- The ACT Government continues to support a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.
- Should the STA-SAFE consortium present a proposal to conduct a controlled trial at another festival, the ACT Government will again consider the proposal on its merits.
- We would welcome the opportunity to work with other events that would be open to supporting a pill testing trial.

If asked about Cattleyard's requirements:

- The ACT Government evaluated the proposal by independent consortium STA-SAFE for a
 controlled trial to take place at GTM_and determined that a trial was appropriate to occur at
 that event.
- Through our Cross Government Working Group, we have worked closely with our law enforcement agencies.
- Law enforcement has indicated it will not interfere with the conduct of a pill testing trial.
 However they would maintain a strong presence at any music festival as part of their usual law enforcement activities at such events.
- It is important to be very clear that the possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs remain illegal in the ACT and at the festival.

- The ACT Government also does not approve or condone illicit drug use. Our message to the community will always be that it is dangerous to take illicit drugs.
- Allowing pill testing to occur is about providing a health intervention prior to a young-person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry

- A Parliamentary Committee Inquiry in Victoria Investigating laws and regulation of illicit drugs have recently released a report.
- The report proposes authorities, but not festival goers, have access to "back-of-house" testing of substances so they can treat patients and issue alerts to the public to prevent other incidents.

STA-SAFE pill testing trial proposal at Groovin the Moo Canberra 2018

Thank you for your engagement in discussions with the ACT Government regarding the STA-SAFE proposal to trial a pill testing service at Groovin the Moo Canberra on 29 April 2018. Thank you also for providing a list of your requirements on 26 February 2018. You have indicated that Cattleyard Promotions' support for the trial is contingent on each of these requirements being met.

The most significant of these requirements is to have indemnity from prosecution provided to all patrons of the pill testing service. As raised with you previously in discussions, ACT legislation does not allow for police officers to be directed to ignore illegal activity or to not act on their reasonable suspicion of illegal activity.

ACT Policing have confirmed that their policy at the festival would include not specifically targeting patrons in the vicinity of the pill testing area. ACT Policing are supportive of pill testing as a harm minimisation strategy and are keen for the trial to run smoothly for everyone involved, including young people using a service which would be available for the first time.

Could you please confirm as soon as possible whether, given our advice above, your position on the policing issue and its impact on your support for the pill testing trial remains unchanged? A meeting with yourself and relevant government personnel to discuss this and other issues can be arranged if this is considered useful in alleviating your concerns.



Today, the ACT Greens have joined with some of the nation's leading drug law reform and harm minimisation experts, to call on the promoters of the Groovin The Moo (GTM) festival to commit to a pill testing trial and "potentially save lives".

With only weeks to go before the festival, the open letter http://keepcanberrasafe.org.au/ sends a strong and clear message from across the health, community services and music sectors that reaffirms the need for pill testing as an evidence-based public health initiative.

"For too long, our young people have been at risk from unknown and contaminated drugs. Each year, we are seeing young people being hospitalised, or worse, after consuming contaminated or unknown drugs at clubs and music festivals," the signatories wrote.

"This is an opportunity for Groovin The Moo to be a leader in the festival industry by supporting an evidence-based approach and allowing a pill testing trial at this year's Canberra festival.

"We urge you to support this important public health initiative, and in doing so, potentially save lives at this year's event.

"Informed by advice from experts and using laboratory grade equipment, a pill testing trial at your festival has the support of ACT Health and ACT Policing, and the ACT Government has given its support after an extensive risk assessment process and receipt of the relevant legal advice.

"We know that there is significant support for pill testing amongst young Australians, with a recent survey showing that more than 85% of respondents supported free on-site pill testing being available, and more than 80% believing that it would help drug users seek help to reduce harm."

"This is a unique and urgent opportunity to potentially save lives, and protect our young people from real harm," said ACT Greens Spokesperson for Drug Law Reform Shane Rattenbury.

"A pill testing trial will make this, and other festivals, safer places to be. Our hope is that the promoter will also see the importance, the urgency and the opportunity of protecting our young people from the well-known risks associated with illicit drug consumption."

It comes as an independent review of Australia's National Drug Strategy has found https://eurekalert.org/pub_releases/2018-04/bc-rbr040418.php that on-site testing of 'party drug' pills could reduce the harms caused by drug use and potentially save lives.

In January nine people were taken to hospital, some in critical condition, after being treated for suspected drug overdoses at a music festival in Melbourne.



Here are the talking points I've developed around pill testing for your review — I've also printed these out for you.

Talking points for use if asked about pill testing at Groovin the Moo 2018.

Is a pill testing trial proceeding at Groovin the Moo 2018 in the ACT?

The ACT Government can confirm that an Australian first pill testing trial will be undertaken at the 'Groovin the Moo '018' Festival in Canberra.

The very clear message from the ACT Government is 'don't do drugs'.

However, festival goers will be able to have their pills tested at a facility adjacent to first aid services and the ambulance service. The testing facility will be enclosed to provide privacy for people seeking to have their pills tested, similar to a medical cubicle.

We support pill testing as a method for harm minimisation. This trial will assist us to better understand how pill testing may help reduce the harms of illicit drug use at festivals.

Why is the government supporting pill testing?

The ACT Government provides a supportive policy environment for a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.

Available evidence indicates that providing consumers with information about the content of illegal drugs can duce harms associated with taking unknown substances.

As pill testing has never been trialled before in Australia, the decision to implement it is not solely ours, as there are multiple stakeholders involved in undertaking the exercise.

In-depth reviews were conducted to inform our support for the trial, based on overseas studies and as part of a Whole of Government Working Group to investigate pill testing.

If pressed on evidence

Pill testing facilities have been effectively used internationally since the 1990's and are currently available in approximately 20 countries in Europe, the Americas and New Zealand.

A report from Austria found that half of those who had their drugs tested stated the results affected their consumption choices and two-thirds said they would not consume the drug and would warn friends in case of negative results.

How will it work?

The controlled trial will be conducted by an independent consortium, STA-SAFE.

amphetamines and MDMA are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them.

Does pill testing promote or condone drug use?

Evidence suggests that people don't end up consuming more illicit substances as a result of a pill testing service. Pill testing services are a unique opportunity to effectively encourage people who use illicit drugs to modify their behaviours in ways that reduce risks of harm to their health.

I have informed the cross-government working group.

ISSUE: Media interest on pill testing ahead at the music festival on

Talking points:

 I am pleased to say that an Australian first pill testing trial will be undertaken at the 'Groovin the Moo 2018' Festival in Canberra over the weekend.

- Cattleyard have confirmed that they will allow the trial to take place at the event by independent consortium STA-SAFE.
- The ACT Government is providing a supportive policy environment for the controlled trial to take place.
- It is dangerous to take illicit drugs and I want to be very clear that our message to festival goers is 'don't do drugs'. The possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs is also illegal in the ACT and at the festival.
- Allowing a trial is about ensuring that people who decide to do drugs at events such as this, are doing so in a safer and more informed way.
- Pill testing also provides a health intervention prior to a person taking a substance, which
 could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at
 risk.
- In addition, this trial will assist us to better understand how pill testing may help reduce the harms of illicit drug use at festivals.

Question and Answer:

Why is the government supporting pill testing?

The ACT Government is providing a supportive policy environment for a controlled trial of pill testing, conducted by an independent consortium.

Available evidence indicates that providing consumers with information about the content of illegal drugs can reduce harms associated with taking unknown substances.

As pill testing has never been trialled before in Australia, the decision to implement it is not solely ours, as there are multiple stakeholders involved in undertaking the exercise.

In-depth reviews were conducted to inform our support for the trial, based on overseas studies and as part of a Whole of Government Working Group to investigate pill testing.

If pressed on evidence

Pill testing facilities have been effectively used internationally since the 1990's and are currently available in approximately 20 countries in Europe, the Americas and New Zealand.

A report from Austria found that half of those who had their drugs tested stated the results affected their consumption choices and two-thirds said they would not consume the drug and would warn friends in case of negative results.

How will it work?

The controlled trial will be conducted by an independent consortium, STA-SAFE.

Pill testing is a harm reduction service that analyses the contents of drugs and helps you avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous substances often found in illicit drugs.

Festival goers will be able to have their pills tested at a facility adjacent to first aid services and the ambulance service.

The testing facility will be enclosed to provide privacy for people seeking to have their pills tested, similar to a medical cubicle.

Service staff test a small sample of received pills, then interpret and provide the results with information about the risks of consuming the substances identified in the sample.

Why should people test their pills?

The composition of illicit drugs is highly variable and unpredictable. The makers of illicit drugs will frequently cut pills with other substances, or substitute other more dangerous drugs entirely. Drugs may also be produced and distributed in unfavourable environments.

Pill testing enables better risk management by consumers. It helps you make an informed decision on whether or not to take the drug if it is found to contain unexpected substances.

How did the proposal come to the ACT Government

In February 2018, the STA-SAFE consortium submitted a proposal to conduct a pill testing trial at the GTM music festival at the University of Canberra on 29 April 2018.

ACT Health reconvened the Cross Government Pill Testing Working Group to examine the STA-SAFE proposal.

Has ACT law enforcement been involved?

We have worked closely with our law enforcement agencies through our Cross Government Working Group,

Law enforcement has indicated it will not interfere with the conduct of a pill testing trial. However they would maintain a strong presence at any music festival as part of their usual law enforcement activities at such events.

It is important to be very clear that the possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs remain illegal in the ACT and at the festival.

What if someone overdoses on drugs?

The ACT Government maintains a clear message: 'don't do drugs'.

The reality is, Illicit drugs such as amphetamines and MDMA are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them.

Offering pill testing is about reducing this harm. It is about ensuring that people who decide to do drugs at events such as this, are doing so in a safer and more informed way.

Pill testing also provides a health intervention prior to a person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

Does pill testing promote or condone drug use?

It is important to be very clear that the possession, supply, and manufacture of illicit drugs remain illegal in the ACT and at the festival.

Our message to festival goers is 'don't do drugs'.

Evidence suggests that people don't end up consuming more illicit substances as a result of a pill testing service.

Pill testing services are a unique opportunity to effectively encourage people who use illicit drugs to modify their behaviours in ways that reduce risks of harm to their health.

What happens next?

ACT Health will work with STA-SAFE to evaluate the trial, following the festival.

We will draw on these results to inform our next steps and future drug policy.

No, consumption of illicit drugs carries an inherent risk of harm. Pill testing services operate on a harm reduction principle. Pill testing services provide information on the contents of the drugs tested, which might include unexpected contaminants or substances, the risks involved, and how to reduce them. Even with laboratory equipment testing, service staff never advise users that the drug they are taking is 'safe.'

Also, chemical analysis is not able to determine with certainty whether a person will have a toxic reaction to taking a pill, although certain contaminants are highly toxic and likely to cause harm if ingested. Illicit drugs are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them.

What is pill testing?

Pill testing is a harm reduction service (also known as drug checking) that analyses the contents of drugs and helps you avoid taking unknown and potentially dangerous substances often found in illicit drugs.

Service staff test a small sample of your pill, then interpret and provide the results with information about the risks of consuming the substances identified in the sample.

Pill testing facilities have been effectively used internationally since the 1990's and are currently available in approximately 20 countries in Europe, the Americas and New Zealand.

What is harm reduction?

Harm reduction includes measures aimed at reducing the adverse health, social and economic consequences of the use of drugs, for the user, their families and the wider community. Harm reduction makes up one of the three pillars of the balanced harm minimisation approached outlined in the National Drug Strategy 2017-2026.

Why should I test my pill?

The composition of illicit drugs is highly variable and unpredictable. The makers of illicit drugs will frequently cut pills with other substances, or substitute other more dangerous drugs entirely. Drugs may also be produced and distributed in unfavourable Pill testing enables better risk management by consumers. It helps you make an informed decision on whether or not to take the drug if it is found to contain unexpected substances.

How will my pills be tested?

asked to undertake a pre-test self-assessment which will ask what you believe the substance is and to then provide a small scraping The pill testing service will be conducted by volunteer medical staff and analytical chemists using a mobile laboratory. You will be of the substance onto the test equipment.

After the pill has been tested, the staff will provide you with information regarding the results and discuss the risks of drug taking. You will be given an opportunity to discard the illicit substance in the amnesty bin.

Who will be doing the pill testing?

No. Pill testing services operate on a harm reduction principle. The service will provide you with information on the contents, the risks involved, and how to reduce them. Even with laboratory level testing, service staff never advise users that the drug they are

although certain contaminants are highly toxic and likely to cause harm if ingested. Illicit drugs such as amphetamines and MDMA are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them. Also, chemical analysis is also not able to determine with certainty whether a person will have a toxic reaction to taking a pill,

Are legislative changes needed to allow pill testing to happen in the ACT?

STA-SAFE has not proposed any change to the legislative status of illicit drugs in the ACT. The possession, supply, and use of illicit drugs remains illegal in the ACT. However, pill testing is a method of harm minimisation and aims to keep people safe.

What evidence is available that pill testing actually reduces harm?

Available evidence indicates that providing consumers with information about the content of illegal drugs they intend to ingest can reduce rates of overdose or toxicity from unknown substances.

identified 39 different psychoactive substances. More than 75 per cent of patrons believed their substance was MDMA or LSD. The NGO reported the impact on patron's behaviour being significant with patrons making more considered and safer decisions. 63 per cent of patrons indicated they did not intend to take the drug when they learnt it was not what was expected.

The available literature does not provide evidence that pill testing prevents deaths among festival patrons. Any such effect would be difficult to study due to the unpredictable nature of adverse events from illicit drug consumption.

Does pill testing promote or condone drug use?

No- evidence suggests that people don't end up consuming more illicit substances as a result of a pill testing service. Pill testing services are a unique opportunity to effectively encourage people who use illicit drugs to modify their behaviours in ways that

The working group has undertaken significant consultation that was overwhelmingly in ACT Health together with Justice and Community Safety Directorate (JACS), ACT Ambulance Service (ACTAS) and ACT Policing favour of pill testing being allowed to take place in the ACT.

Summary of key operational features of a harm reduction service offering 'pill testing' at a major music festival in the ACT

Operational elements of pill testing services offered by a harm reduction service at a major music festival

- A separate stand-alone service will be established, located in close proximity to the event's medical area.
- The staff undertaking pill testing will be appropriately trained in using pill testing equipment
- Staff who are trained in drug counselling will deliver advice and intervention about drug use
- The equipment used for pill testing must be able to reliably, within an acceptable timeframe, identify the major drug present in an unknown tablet or powder as well as potentially detect adulterants and/or substances that are unknown.
- Regular communication should flow between the event organiser as well as ambulance and medical personnel in the nearby medical area to share information on the results of pill testing; this regular communication should assist with informing medical procedures in the case of overdose or other adverse event.
- Pill testing has limitations and these must be communicated to patrons of the pill testing service. This includes communicating that pill testing does not guarantee identification of each substance contained within a substance.
- Each patron must be directly notified, regardless of the pill testing result, that drug taking is inherently unsafe. Each patron must be notified that safe disposal of drugs is the best way to avoid health risk.
- The service must provide an amnesty bin for safe disposal of drugs. These drugs must be destroyed onsite such that
- Bins must be provided by the service for safe disposal of drugs. The drugs contained
 in amnesty bins must be destroyed on site, such that they cannot be reconstituted
 and safely disposed of at the conclusion of the event by the harm reduction service.
- The harm reduction service will collect evaluative data, which would include but not be limited to:
 - The number of patrons attending the service
 - o The number of brief interventions as well as pill tests delivered
 - o The number of patrons who discarded their drug at the service
 - o The chemical content detected in each sample tested



The pill testing trial conducted by independent consortium STA-SAFE at Groovin the Moo yesterday was successful and well attended with rumberof:people using the new service.

This was the first pill testing trial to be carried in Australia and enabled people who decided to do drugs at the festival to make more informed choices.

Pill testing analyses the contents of drugs and can help individuals avoid taking unknown and potentially harmful substances.

We understand from STA-SAFE that there were around snumber of tests conducted. The tests found traces of substances such as sinsert details?

It is dangerous to take illicit substances and our message to the community and young people remains: 'don't do drugs'.

The ACT Government would like to thank festival organisers Cattleyard Promotions for their cooperation and acknowledge that by allowing the trial to take place, they had the best interests of their patrons at heart.

We would also like to acknowledge the STA-SAFE consortium for successfully carrying out the trial.

ACT Government statement on Groovin the Moo pill testing trial 30 April 2018

The <u>incident</u> at the Groovin the Moo' festival on Sunday was a tragedy and underscores the risks associated with illicit drug use.

Supporting a pill testing trial at the event was about reducing harm and ensuring that people who were deciding to do drugs at the event, were doing so in a more informed way.

Pill testing provides a health intervention prior to a person taking a substance, which could be what changes their mind from taking the illicit substance and putting themselves at risk.

However, illicit drugs such as amphetamines and MDMA are inherently unsafe and pill testing cannot certify that a person will not suffer an adverse reaction as a result of taking them.

The ACT Government would like to thank festival organisers Cattleyard Promotions for their cooperation and acknowledge that by allowing the trial to take place, they had the best interests of their patrons at heart.

We would also like to acknowledge the STA-SAFE consortium for carrying out the trial.

ACT Health will now work with STA-SAFE to evaluate the trial. This will assist us to better understand how pill testing may help reduce the harms of illicit drug use at festivals and will inform our next steps and future drug policy.







Dear all

I have been asked to provide a brief report on the pill testing trial at Grooving the Moo today. I was the ambulance commander on site and responsible for all first aid and ambulance activities and while not responsible for their activities, I liaised closely with other health services on site, including Head Space and Red Frogs as well as the pill testing consortium.

I received very good information from the pill testing consortium. They were pleasantly surprised by the number of patrons presenting for testing. At the event start, they were expecting to test no more than 30 pills across the event. When they closed, they had interviewed approximately 130 patrons and conducted 86 tests. One of those tests was done at the request of ACTP after a bag of capsules were handed in.

Approximately half of items tested showed inert or non-illicit substances, mostly sugar or lactose. The most unusual item detected was Polish toothpaste. Of concern in this group was the detection of anti-histamines in one pill.

Of the items where an illicit substance was detected, most were MDMA – believed to be of high purity. Smaller amounts of ketamine were detected. Of particular concern was one item where they detected a substance not previously recorded and believed to be a novel NBOMe with psycho-stimulant and hallucinogenic properties. The other concerning detection was n-ethypentylone, a cathinone implicated in fatalities overseas. Five patrons elected to surrender their drugs to the pill testers. There is no indication as to what the remaining patrons did, though security reported a number of pill bags discarded on the site; this is unusual in my experience and likely attributable to the pill testing.

Numbers seen by event medical services were consistent with previous events; 85 assessed and treated on site, 3 transported by ACTAS. Of the three transported, two were drug affected (most likely MDMA + alcohol) – neither had attended pill testing. The majority of patient presentations were for intoxication, generally alcohol and/or MDMA. There was no indication of novel or unusual illicit substances. Liaison with Red Frogs and Head Space indicated patient numbers consistent with other music festivals, again with no unusual presentations.

Overall, it appears that pill testing was successful in that a reasonable number of patrons presented for testing and a several substances were detected; mostly innocuous with a couple very concerning. However, other than possibly an increase in the amount of illicit substances discarded, there is no evidence of decreased presentations to site health services nor any noticeable change in crowd behaviour. I liaised with the ACTP Forward Commander and he agreed with this assessment and stated he would be briefing the CPO accordingly.

I am advised Minister Rattenbury attended the pill testing service, was briefed by the volunteers there and expressed his support for their work. Minister Rattenbury did not contact event health services, nor ACTP to my knowledge.

I trust this information is helpful. If I can be of further assistance, please let me know.
