DECISION ON YOUR ACCESS APPLICATION

I refer to your application under section 30 of the *Freedom of Information Act 2016* (FOI Act), received by ACT Health Directorate (AHD) on Tuesday 29 October 2019 and rescoped on Thursday 21 November 2019.

This application requested access to:

'Under the 2016 Freedom of Information Act, I request access to documents dated from 1 January 2019 to date related to change in the scope, location. timing and estimated cost of the Surgical Procedures Interventional Radiology and Emergency or SPIRE project. In particular, I am seeking access to:

- a) Briefs prepared for Ministers related to the SPIRE project including estimates briefs, annual reports briefs, question time briefs and all other types of briefs.
- b) Documents related to the transfer of responsibility for the project from ACT Health and Canberra Health Services to Major Projects;
- c) Communications strategy and related documents related to SPIRE including social media material;
- d) Planning documents related to SPIRE including traffic studies and other studies performed as part of developing the project;
- e) Correspondence with other directorates, unions, professional organisations, community groups and other relevant persons about changes to the location, scope, timing or cost of the project
- f) Documents related to meetings to discuss SPIRE including agenda and minutes of meeting. This does not include documents of a purely administrative nature such as booking a room;
- Documents related to consultation with Canberra Health Services staff, professional organisations, local residents, regional residents and other relevant bodies related to changes to the location, scope, timing or cost of SPIRE;
- h) Costing of the SPIRE project, including for its changed location and scope;
- i) Contracts related to planning for SPIRE Project Main Works and SPIRE Project Enabling Works and any relevant development applications related to the SPIRE project.'

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General of ACT Health Directorate (AHD) under section 18 of the FOI Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the Act. AHD was required to provide a decision on your access application by **Thursday 19 December 2019**.

As agreed, on Wednesday 4 December 2019, AHD will provide the remaining documents to the response on Friday 14 February 2019 due to the size of this response and requirement of third-party consultation.

I have identified 32 documents holding the information within scope of your access application to sections A and B. These are outlined in the schedule of documents included at <u>Attachment A</u> to this decision letter.

Decisions

I have decided to:

- · grant full access to 21 documents;
- grant part access to 6 documents; and
- refuse access to 5 documents.

My access decisions are detailed further in the following statement of reasons and the documents released to you are provided as <u>Attachment B</u> to this letter.

In reaching my access decision, I have taken the following into account:

- The FOI Act;
- The contents of the documents that fall within the scope of your request; and
- The Human Rights Act 2004.

Full Access

I have decided to grant full access to 21 documents relevant to the scope of your request. Documents at reference numbers 1-2, 4, 6-9, 11-12, 16-21, 23-24 and 29-32 are provided in full.

Refuse Access

I have decided to refuse access to five documents at reference numbers 3, 5, 10, 13 and 15 as outlined in the schedule of documents. These documents are wholly comprised of Information that would reveal deliberations of Cabinet. These documents are therefore taken to be contrary to the public interest to release, under Schedule 1.6 (1) Cabinet Information (d) the disclosure of which would reveal any deliberation of Cabinet (other than through the official publication of a Cabinet decision).

Partial Access

I have decided to grant partial access to six documents. Documents 14 and 26-28 of the identified documents contain information that I consider, on balance, to be contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in section 17 of the Act as the information contained in these folios is partially comprised of personal information of government employees in accordance with Schedule 2.2 (a) (ii) prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2004. On balance, I determined the information identified is contrary to the public interest and I have decided not to disclose this information.

Document 25 of the identified documents contain information that I consider, on balance, to be contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in section 17 of the Act as the information contained in this folio is partially comprised of Cabinet information. The information is therefore taken to be contrary to the public interest to release, under Schedule 1.6 (1) Cabinet Information (d) the disclosure of which would reveal any deliberation of Cabinet (other than through

the official publication of a Cabinet decision). On balance, I determined the information identified is contrary to the public interest and I have decided not to disclose this information.

Document 22 of the identified documents contain information that I consider, on balance, to be contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in section 17 of the Act as the information contained in this folio is partially comprised of both Cabinet information and personal information of government employees. The information is therefore taken to be contrary to the public interest to release, under Schedule 1.6 (1) Cabinet Information (d) the disclosure of which would reveal any deliberation of Cabinet (other than through the official publication of a Cabinet decision) and in accordance with Schedule 2.2 (a) (ii) prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2004. On balance, I determined the information identified is contrary to the public interest and I have decided not to disclose this information.

Charges

Processing charges are not applicable to this request.

The scope of your access application, my decision and documents released to you will be published in the disclosure log not less than three days but not more than 10 days after the date of this decision.  Input from the ACT Health Directorate on any current issues the Minister may need to raise with the new Canberra Business Chamber Chief Executive Officer

Content for Clearance:

- The Territory continues to make progress on the planning and design for major new infrastructure projects, including:
 - The Expansion of the Centenary Hospital for Women and Children;
 - The Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE)
 Centre project;
 - Northside Hospital Scoping Study (in close collaboration with Calvary Healthcare);
 - Weston Creek Walk-in Centre (currently in design phase); and
 - Inner North Walk-in Centre (currently in an early planning).

Expansion of the Centenary Hospital for Women and Children

- The completion of the Expansion of the Centenary Hospital for Woman and Children (CHWC) project is targeted for 2021-22, with elements of the project due for staged completion over this period.
- Construction of the expansion started during 2018-19 financial year, with security enhancement works to support a Custodial Birth Suite now complete.
- Design work for other elements of the expansion is underway. ACT Health has engaged Silver Thomas Hanley, Health Services Architects, to support the proof of concept process and User Design Group meetings have informed the early designs.
- Planning has commenced for the staging and decanting program, with a view to minimising disruption to Centenary Hospital's health care services.

- The Expansion of the CHWC will feature:
 - an increase in special care nursery beds
 - new adolescent gynaecology procedure room
 - o an increase in inpatient beds for women's and children's services
 - improvements to clinical areas (such as the High Care Ward)
- The Adolescent Mental Health Inpatient Unit (AMHIU) is considered as part of the CHWC Expansion project. It is expected that the AMHIU will be completed in the 2021-22 financial year.

The Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre

- The SPIRE Project is a \$500 million investment in the ACT's health care infrastructure. It is part of a 2016 election commitment to address challenges faced in the areas of critical care and emergency services by the ACT public health system.
- Following extensive planning and feasibility work, the SPIRE Centre will be built at the north-eastern end of the Canberra Hospital campus. Buildings 5 and 24 currently occupy the nominated development site.
- The SPIRE Centre site location was announced to the public on 12 December 2018 with project updates available on the <u>ACT Health website</u>.
- The new SPIRE Centre features:
 - a boost to the number of operating theatres, delivering more capacity for elective and emergency surgery
 - more inpatient beds and a larger intensive care unit
 - a larger coronary care unit for people requiring high level care for heart conditions
 - o state-of-the-art surgical, procedural and imaging facilities
 - a significantly expanded ED, improving capacity for specialist emergency healthcare for women and children
- Staging and decanting planning has commenced, and buildings 24 and 5 will be demolished as part of site preparation, starting in 2019. SPIRE construction and commissioning is anticipated to be completed in the 2023-24 financial year.
- ACT Health has engaged Silver Thomas Hanley to support the staging and decanting planning process and develop a Proof of Concept design. This will be considered by government in early 2019.

Northside Hospital Scoping Study

Background

- Victor Pantano, Chair of Garran Primary School Board wrote to you on 24 March 2019, requesting to meet with you in regard to their concerns about the potential increase of traffic along Gilmore Crescent during the construction of SPIRE.
- 2. The meeting was held on Thursday 11 April 2019. Attendees Included:
 - Liz Lopa, (Executive Group Manager, Strategic Infrastructure, ACTHD);
 - Monica Lindemann, (Strategic Infrastructure, ACTHD);
 - John Ryan, (ACT Education Directorate);
 - Andrew Crichton, (Transport Canberra and City Services (TCCS);
 - Victor Pantano, (Chair of Garran Primary School Board); and
 - Jenny Priest, (Principal, Garran Primary School).
- The school community have been subjected to heavy vehicle traffic generated by building works at the hospital for many years, it was noted in the meeting that the continued growth of the hospital, resulting in more traffic is inevitable.
- The Principal noted during the meeting that traffic management and safety issues have been dealt with as they arise. However, this approach is believed to be insufficient to meet the long term needs of Garran community.

Issues

- 5. Key issues were discussed at the meeting:
 - Concerns about student and community safety due to high volume traffic, including heavy vehicles down Gilmore Crescent;
 - The school's proximity to the hospital, the Board would like the school considered as part of the hospital "precinct" and that it be included in campus master planning; and
 - Suggestions from the Board to improve safety include:
 - Widening/modifying Gilmore Crescent;
 - Making Gilmore Crescent a one-way street;
 - More set-down and pick-up space; and
 - More parking spaces.
- ACTHD agreed to continue conversations with the relevant Directorates to support improved traffic safety for childfree and school community members and agreed to include Garran Primary School in hospital master planning as it relates to access, traffic management, parking and pedestrian safety.

Dear Ministers Berry and Fitzharris

I am writing to you as Chair of the Garran Primary School Board to request a meeting with you to discuss the planning that is currently underway in relation to the new SPIRE Centre to be located on the corner of Gilmore and Palmer Streets at the Canberra Hospital. The construction of the Centre will have a significantly detrimental impact on the operations of the school.

The school has had significant issues with traffic on Gllmore Crescent for a long time and we have suffered from several near misses with our children over the years. In more recent years, we have been impacted by the construction of the National Capital Private Hospital, including its current expansion. The addition of construction traffic has made it difficult to access the school, find parking and has resulted in an increase in traffic in the school area which means it has become dangerous for our children to cross the road. Further there is a lack of traffic access for parents to drop off and collect students within the school grounds. We suffer from traffic chaos on an almost daily basis.

The construction of SPIRE offers an opportunity for us to change this and make serious modifications to ensure the safety of our school students and wider community both during construction and then after when thousands of people will access the centre weekly. There will be a significant impact on our school environment as a result of SPIRE, not to mention Gilmore Crescent.

The Education Directorate has undertaken numerous studies of the traffic flows in the area but we have had no resolution. It is only a matter time before a serious incident occurs. As such I would appreciate a meeting with you both to discuss how we can work together to achieve major change either ahead of SPIRE or in concert with its construction.

- On 19 June 2019, the Chief Minister announced a new collaboration and coordination initiative within the ACT Public Service, with MPC commencing on 1 July 2019.
- This new major project team will lead the planning, procurement and delivery of some
 of the territory's largest ever infrastructure projects: Light Rail Stage 2 and the SPIRE

- SPIRE was also a significant commitment at the 2016 election and forms part of the ACT Government's plan to future-proof Canberra's healthcare system to meeting ongoing demand for health care.

- 5. The project management of SPIRE, as a Tier 1 capital project, was managed by ACTHD, with consultations between Canberra Health services (CHS) management and clinicals.
- 6. The Section 16 instrument will reallocate 2019-20 capital budget of \$60.2 million to MPC and will ensure that the allocated project capital appropriation is available to MPC in the delivery of SPIRE. A letter to the Treasurer requesting the transfer of capital funds is at Attachment A for your signature.

I am writing to request a Section 16 instrument under the *Financial Management Act 1996* to transfer the Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre from the ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) to Major Projects Canberra (MPC) commencing 1 July 2019.

This proposal seeks your agreement to transfer \$60.2 million for the upgrade and expansion of Canberra hospital. The transfer will ensure that sufficient capital appropriation is available for MPC to meet the cost of SPIRE related expenditure.



Minister's question/s:

- At 31 March 2019 the Directorate was \$7.2 million below budget, however the 2018-19 Estimated Outcome is \$12.3 million over budget. What is the reason for this dramatic change?
- When will the actuals for 2018-19 be available?

ACT Health's response:

The reason for the movmenet of \$19.5 million relates mainly to:

- The timing of payments to Canberra Health Services (CHS) (\$33 million) to finalise the separation of budgets following the 1 October 2018 Administrative Arrangement Order; and
- Offset by major infrastructure feasibility study expenditure related to Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiolody and Emergency Centre (SPIRE) and Northside hospital, which was expected to occur in the last quarter of the financial year (~\$6.0 million), which will be requested as a roll over through a Section 16B instrument (under the Financial Management Act, 1996).

It should be noted that the 2018-19 Estimated Outcome does not represent an overspend. The deficit reflects Government policy not to fund Directorates for depreciation or employee provisions and is consistent with the original combined (ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) and CHS) ACTHD budgeted operating deficit of \$60 million.

The actuals for 2018-19 will be available officially on the 3 October 2019. Financial Statements are due to the Audit Office on the 25 July 2019 for the audit of accounts and records.



The planning phase of SPIRE included staff from ACT Health, CHS, Treasury (IFCW) and many specialist consultants including business case specialists, architects, facility planners, urban planners and cost planners.

ACT Health's infrastructure team and executives - including facility and service planners - all worked on the SPIRE project. This team consisted of up to 12 people at any given time. However, these staff were also working on other projects at some times - including the centenary hospital project. A project control group and steering committee existed

It was always intended to establish a project team focussed on the delivery of SPIRE once the business case was successful. This team had not yet been established when MPC was announced - meaning there were few people

- The ACT Government has established a new infrastructure delivery body, Major Projects Canberra (MPC), as an expert infrastructure delivery team.
- The new body was established on 1 July 2019 and is leading the procurement and delivery of the territory's signature infrastructure projects. This includes Light Rail Stage 2 and the SPIRE project at Canberra Hospital.
- The establishment of MPC has involved bringing together staff responsible for the delivery areas of these major projects from TCCS, the Health Directorate and CMTEDD.
- Acknowledging the scale and complexity of these major projects, there has been significant
 work undertaken to ensure arrangements have been adjusted in a timely way to ensure
 minimal impacts on project delivery timeframes and on staff transitioning to the new body.
 This included the establishment of a transition team with representation from relevant
 Directorates.
- MPC will continue to work across ACT Government and with key stakeholders as these major projects progress.
- Investing in infrastructure that supports Canberra's prosperity, liveability and social inclusion is a key priority.
- In recent years, the Government has stepped up our investments in new health infrastructure and public transport.
