Fever (≥37.5°C) or history of fever (e.g. night sweat, chills) in the absence of a clear alternative cause, such as a urinary tract infection or cellulitis

OR

 Acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat).

OR

Sudden onset of loss of sense of smell or taste

Patients with sudden onset of runny nose/blocked nose, muscle pain, joint pain, diarrhoea, nausea, vomiting or loss of appetite can be tested for COVID-19 in the absence of fever or respiratory symptoms if no alternative cause for these symptoms is apparent, at the discretion of the treating clinician.

Testing of asymptomatic individuals is not generally recommended. However, some individuals may be asked by ACT Health (or another public health authority such as NSW Health) to be tested even if asymptomatic.

Testing Locations

- GPs can collect specimens for COVID-19 themselves if they wish to. Please refer to the <u>Specimen Collection Guidelines</u> for details.
- Patients can be directed to one of the <u>COVID-19 Testing</u> <u>Clinics</u> located across the ACT.
- Testing is performed free of charge for symptomatic individuals.
- No appointment is required for ACT Government COVID-19 Testing Clinics. Appointments are required for the GP Respiratory Clinics in Crace and Greenway.
- Clinic locations, opening hours and booking details (where relevant) are available on the <u>ACT COVID-19 website</u>. Many testing clinics operate 7 days a week.
- Please note that asymptomatic individuals cannot be tested at these clinics, unless directed to be tested by ACT Health or another public health authority (e.g. NSW Health). Other asymptomatic patients who require COVID-19 testing (e.g. prior to boarding an international flight) can be sent to private pathology collection centres with a request form. Patients may be charged for their test in these circumstances.
- Patients can be sent to a suitable private pathology collection centre with a pathology request form.
- Testing is free of charge for symptomatic patients who are eligible for Medicare.
 - Details of suitable collection centres for COVID-19 testing are included in the <u>Chief Health Officer alert for GPs and other</u> <u>community health practitioners</u>.

Public health advice for high-risk settings and health professionals regarding interstate COVID-19 outbreaks (new information in red)

Key Points

- There is a current outbreak of COVID-19 cases associated with the Sydney Northern Beaches Local Government Area (LGA) and other affected locations in NSW.
- Anyone who has been in a <u>geographical area of risk</u> should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days after leaving the affected area.
- A Public Health Direction came into effect at 11.59 AM on 18 December 2020 mandating testing and quarantine for anyone in the ACT who has been in Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December. Quarantine is required for 14 days from the date they were last there.
- Anyone in the ACT who has been to any <u>listed locations at the time specified by NSW</u>
 Health must follow NSW Health advice AND call ACT Health on (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.

What is the situation?

- There is a current outbreak of COVID-19 cases associated with the Sydney Northern Beaches LGA and other affected locations in NSW.
- Anyone who has been in an area of <u>geographical risk</u> in the previous 14 days should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Canberrans are strongly advised not to visit Sydney at this time.
- Under a Public Health Direction, anyone in the ACT who has travelled to the Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December must get tested and self-quarantine for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Anyone in the ACT who has been to any listed <u>locations</u> at the times specified by NSW must follow NSW Health advice AND call ACT Health on (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.
- Anyone in the ACT who has recently travelled interstate should keep up to date with public health alerts from the jurisdiction they travelled from.
- The advice in this Chief Health Officer alert will be reviewed regularly. The geographical areas of risk in Australia remain subject to change, depending on the COVID-19 situation.

What are geographical areas of risk?

Current geographical areas of risk in Australia are the following areas:

- Greater Sydney
- Wollongong
- Central Coast

ACT Public Health Directions regarding interstate COVID-19 outbreaks

- Anyone who has been in close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case during the case's infectious period must quarantine until 14 days after their last contact with the case.
- A Public Health Direction is in effect from 11.59 AM on 18 December 2020 mandating quarantine for anyone in the ACT who has been in Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December. Quarantine is required for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Some people who attended specific public locations at the same time as a confirmed COVID-19 case may be considered close contacts. People who have attended any of the <u>listed "self-isolate and get tested" locations on the NSW Health page</u> must get tested and quarantine for 14 days AND call ACT Health (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.

What are high-risk settings?

- A high-risk setting is defined as a setting where there are a large number of people who are vulnerable to severe disease from COVID-19 (e.g. due to age or chronic medical conditions), and/or where there is a higher risk of COVID-19 transmission due to close proximity and difficulties maintaining physical distancing.
- These high-risk settings are:
 - Hospitals
 - Residential aged care facilities
 - Correctional facilities
 - Residential accommodation facilities that support people who require frequent, close personal care and who are vulnerable to severe disease

Advice for high-risk settings

- Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) must not visit or work in a high-risk setting.
- Anyone who has been in a geographical area of risk (see above) should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days since leaving these areas.
- If someone is excluded from visiting or working in a high-risk setting, but is seeking to visit on compassionate grounds, or to work because they are deemed essential (e.g. someone with expertise that cannot be sourced elsewhere):
 - If they are in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), they will need to apply for an exemption by emailing <u>COVID.exemptions@act.gov.au</u>.
 - o If they are <u>not</u> in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), this should be considered following a risk assessment, in consultation with ACT Health.

Advice for staff providing home-based aged care, disability and other support services

 Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) should not provide home-based aged care, disability or other support services.

- If the service deems it is essential for the staff member to continue in their role:
 - o If they are in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), they will need to apply for an exemption by emailing COVID.exemptions@act.gov.au.
 - If they are <u>not</u> in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), the staff member's manager should undertake a risk assessment to determine whether it is appropriate for the staff member to return to work. Considerations include the staff member's risk of exposure to COVID-19, duration of close physical contact with clients and client vulnerability to COVID-19. The risk assessment should be done in consultation with ACT Health.

Advice for general practitioners and other community health practitioners

- Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) must not work in a community health setting, unless ACT Health grants them an exemption to do so.
- GPs and other community health practitioners who have been in a geographical area of risk (see above), but who are not in quarantine under a Public Health Direction, should be particularly vigilant for symptoms of COVID-19. If symptoms develop, they should immediately self-isolate and arrange to get tested for COVID-19.
- Health practitioners should actively seek a patient's travel history and advise them to go into quarantine and get tested if applicable. If unsure, contact ACT Health on (02) 5124 6209.

- Authorised person means an authorised person under section 121 of the Public Health Act 1997.
- 10. COVID-19 hotspot means a location outside of the Australian Capital Territory that is specified in Column 1 of Schedule 1 on the dates specified in Column 2 of Schedule 1.
- 11. Unless stated otherwise in writing by the Chief Health Officer, **designated premises** means:
 - a. the person's usual place of residence or other premises that is suitable for the person to reside in for a **period of quarantine**; or
 - b. if the person is not normally a resident of the Australian Capital Territory, a hotel or other premises that has been approved in writing by the Chief Health Officer as suitable to reside in for a period of quarantine.



12. A **period of quarantine** means a period of 14 days, including any period of time that has already elapsed since the person was last in a **COVID-19 hotspot**.

PENALTIES

Section 120 (4) of the Public Health Act 1997 provides:

A person must not, without reasonable excuse, fail to comply with a direction under this section.

Maximum Penalty:

In the case of a natural person, \$8,000 (50 penalty units).

- 10. **COVID-19 hotspot** means a location outside of the Australian Capital Territory that is specified in Column 1 of Schedule 1 on the dates specified in Column 2 of Schedule 1.
- 11. Unless stated otherwise in writing by the Chief Health Officer, **designated premises** means:
 - a. the person's usual place of residence or other premises that is suitable for the person to reside in for a **period of quarantine**; or
 - b. if the person is not normally a resident of the Australian Capital Territory, a hotel or other premises that has been approved in writing by the Chief Health Officer as suitable to reside in for a period of quarantine.

12. A period of quarantine means a period of 14 days, including any period of time that has already elapsed since the person was last in a COVID-19 hotspot.

PENALTIES

Section 120 (4) of the Public Health Act 1997 provides:

A person must not, without reasonable excuse, fail to comply with a direction under this section.

Maximum Penalty:

In the case of a natural person, \$8,000 (50 penalty units).

Public health advice for high-risk settings and health professionals regarding interstate COVID-19 outbreaks (new information in red)

Key Points

- There is a current outbreak of COVID-19 cases associated with the Sydney Northern Beaches Local Government Area (LGA) and other affected locations in NSW.
- Anyone who has been in a geographical area of risk should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days after leaving the affected area.
- A Public Health Direction came into effect at 11.59 AM on 18 December 2020 mandating testing and quarantine for anyone in the ACT who has been in Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December. Quarantine is required for 14 days from the date they were last there.
- Anyone in the ACT who has been to any listed locations at the time specified by NSW Health must follow NSW Health advice AND call ACT Health on (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.

What is the situation?

- There is a current outbreak of COVID-19 cases associated with the Sydney Northern Beaches LGA and other affected locations in NSW.
- Anyone who has been in an area of geographical risk in the previous 14 days should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Canberrans are strongly advised not to visit Sydney at this time.
- Under a Public Health Direction, anyone in the ACT who has travelled to the Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December must get tested and self-quarantine for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Anyone in the ACT who has been to any listed locations at the times specified by NSW must follow NSW Health advice AND call ACT Health on (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.
- Anyone in the ACT who has recently travelled interstate should keep up to date with public health alerts from the jurisdiction they travelled from.
- The advice in this Chief Health Officer alert will be reviewed regularly. The geographical areas of risk in Australia remain subject to change, depending on the COVID-19 situation.

What are geographical areas of risk?

Current geographical areas of risk in Australia are the following areas:

- **Greater Sydney**
- Wollongong
- Central Coast

See a full list of affected LGAs.

ACT Public Health Directions regarding interstate COVID-19 outbreaks

- Anyone who has been in close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case during the case's
 infectious period must quarantine until 14 days after their last contact with the case.
- A Public Health Direction is in effect from 11.59 AM on 18 December 2020 mandating quarantine for anyone in the ACT who has been in Sydney Northern Beaches LGA from the 11th of December. Quarantine is required for 14 days after leaving the area.
- Some people who attended specific public locations at the same time as a confirmed COVID-19 case may be considered close contacts. People who have attended any of the <u>listed "self-isolate and get tested" locations on the NSW Health page</u> must get tested and quarantine for 14 days AND call ACT Health (02) 5124 9213 for further advice.

What are high-risk settings?

- A high-risk setting is defined as a setting where there are a large number of people who are vulnerable to severe disease from COVID-19 (e.g. due to age or chronic medical conditions), and/or where there is a higher risk of COVID-19 transmission due to close proximity and difficulties maintaining physical distancing.
- These high-risk settings are:
 - Hospitals
 - Residential aged care facilities
 - Correctional facilities
 - Residential accommodation facilities that support people who require frequent, close personal care and who are vulnerable to severe disease

Advice for high-risk settings

- Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) must not visit or work in a high-risk setting.
- Anyone who has been in a geographical area of risk (see above) should not visit or work in a high-risk setting for 14 days since leaving these areas.
- If someone is excluded from visiting or working in a high-risk setting, but is seeking to visit on compassionate grounds, or to work because they are deemed essential (e.g. someone with expertise that cannot be sourced elsewhere):
 - o If they are in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), they will need to apply for an exemption by emailing COVID.exemptions@act.gov.au.
 - o If they are <u>not</u> in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), this should be considered following a risk assessment, in consultation with ACT Health.

Advice for staff providing home-based aged care, disability and other support services

 Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) should not provide home-based aged care, disability or other support services.



- If the service deems it is essential for the staff member to continue in their role:
 - o If they are in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), they will need to apply for an exemption by emailing COVID.exemptions@act.gov.au.
 - o If they are <u>not</u> in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above), the staff member's manager should undertake a risk assessment to determine whether it is appropriate for the staff member to return to work. Considerations include the staff member's risk of exposure to COVID-19, duration of close physical contact with clients and client vulnerability to COVID-19. The risk assessment should be done in consultation with ACT Health.

Advice for general practitioners and other community health practitioners

- Anyone who is in quarantine under a Public Health Direction (see above) must not work in a community health setting, unless ACT Health grants them an exemption to do so.
- GPs and other community health practitioners who have been in a geographical area of risk (see above), but who are not in quarantine under a Public Health Direction, should be particularly vigilant for symptoms of COVID-19. If symptoms develop, they should immediately self-isolate and arrange to get tested for COVID-19.
- Health practitioners should actively seek a patient's travel history and advise them to go into quarantine and get tested if applicable. If unsure, contact ACT Health on (02) 5124 6209.

Testing criteria in the ACT

Test all patients who meet the suspect case definition:

Fever (≥37.5°C) or history of fever (e.g. night sweats, chills) **OR** acute respiratory infection (e.g. cough, shortness of breath, sore throat) **OR** loss of sense of smell or taste

AND

One of the following epidemiological risk factors in the 14 days prior to illness onset:

- Close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case; OR
- International travel, including cruise ship passengers and crew; in the 14 days prior to illness onset; OR
- Travel to a geographical area of risk within Australia; OR
- Healthcare, aged or residential care workers and staff with direct patient contact.

In addition to the suspect case definition, test anyone who meets the following clinical criteria:

 Fever (≥37.5°C) or history of fever (e.g. night sweat, chills) in the absence of a clear alternative cause, such as a urinary tract infection or cellulitis

OR

 Acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat).

OR

Sudden onset of loss of sense of smell or taste

Patients with sudden onset of runny nose/blocked nose, muscle pain, joint pain, diarrhoea, nausea, vomiting or loss of appetite can be tested for COVID-19 in the absence of fever or respiratory symptoms if no alternative cause for these symptoms is apparent, at the discretion of the treating clinician.

Testing of asymptomatic individuals is not generally recommended. However, some individuals may be asked by ACT Health (or another public health authority such as NSW Health) to be tested even if asymptomatic.

Testing Locations

- GPs can collect specimens for COVID-19 themselves if they wish to.
 Please refer to the <u>Specimen Collection Guidelines</u> for details.
- Patients can be directed to one of the <u>COVID-19 Testing</u>
 Clinics located across the ACT.
- Testing is performed free of charge for symptomatic individuals.
- No appointment is required for ACT Government COVID-19 Testing Clinics. Appointments are required for the GP Respiratory Clinics in Crace and Greenway.
- Clinic locations, opening hours and booking details (where relevant) are available on the <u>ACT COVID-19 website</u>. Many testing clinics operate 7 days a week.
- Please note that asymptomatic individuals cannot be tested at these clinics, unless directed to be tested by ACT Health or another public health authority (e.g. NSW Health). Other asymptomatic patients who require COVID-19 testing (e.g. prior to boarding an international flight) can be sent to private pathology collection centres with a request form. Patients may be charged for their test in these circumstances.
- Patients can be sent to a suitable private pathology collection centre with a pathology request form.
- Testing is free of charge for symptomatic patients who are eligible for Medicare.

COVID-19 Information for Hotels and Accommodation venues

Public Health Direction for the Greater Sydney, Central Coast, Illawarra-Shoalhaven and Nepean Blue Mountains — 11.59pm Sunday 20 December 2020

Due to the rapidly evolving COVID-19 situation in the Northern Beaches and Greater Sydney area a legally enforceable Public Health Direction has been put in place by the ACT Chief Health Officer from 11.59 Sunday 20 December 2020.

The Public Health Direction states that anyone entering the ACT from Greater Sydney, Central Coast, Illawarra-Shoalhaven and Nepean Blue Mountains areas will be legally required for guarantine for 14 days from the date they entered the ACT.

The Public Health Direction can be found on the COVID-19 website [hyperlink]

Anyone who arrives in the ACT from 11.59pm Sunday 20 December 2020 will be required to quarantine.

Returning ACT residents will be able to quarantine at home.

What do hotels and accommodations providers need to do under this ACT Public Health Direction?

ACT Health is asking hotels and accommodation providers to screen guests upon arrival and ask if they are from the affected areas of Greater Sydney, Central Coast, Illawarra-Shoalhaven and Nepean Blue Mountains and if they can provide their ACT Health exemption.

A list of areas covered by the direction is available on the www.covid-19.act.gov.au website.

If they are from those affected areas and <u>do not</u> have an exemption from ACT Health, they must be directed to leave and <u>return home immediately</u> as they are in breach of the Public Health Direction.

ACT Health will not be considering exemption requests for non-residents coming from Greater Sydney, except in extreme extenuating circumstances.

If those without an exemption refuse to leave, call the COVID-19 Helpline is (02) 6207 7244 for advice.

What if the guest has an exemption and wants to be accommodated? If the guest/s cannot return home they will need to quarantine for 14 days.

It is at the discretion of the accommodation provider if they are comfortable to accept the quarantining guest/s. If the accommodation provider declines to take any guest, they will have to find an alternate hotel or accommodation provider or leave the ACT.

What happens if they do quarantine in the hotel?

If the guest/s are able to be accommodated, then ACT Health is asking to be notified that the accommodation provider has a guest/s quarantining in their premises.

Does the government pay for anyone's quarantine?

No, all expenses incurred by a guest are at the guest's expense.

What if the guest is an ACT resident?

ACT residents returning to the ACT from the [affected areas] after 11.59pm on Sunday 20 December 2020 are required to quarantine for 14 days and can do so at home.

Some residents may not be able to quarantine effectively from other members of their household and may seek alternative accommodation. It is at the discretion of the hotel or accommodation provider as to whether to take the guest.

ACT Health is asking to be notified that a guest/s quarantining in their premises.

ACT Health COVID-19 team can be contacted on **02 5124 9213** so that the guests can be supported while quarantining.

How are hotels supported to manage quarantining guests safely?

A number of hotels and accommodation providers in the ACT have indicated to ACT Health that they are comfortable to accept quarantining guests and their staff are adequately trained in the use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and infection control.

If your hotel/accommodation has not previously been assessed by ACT Health, you are discouraged from accepting quarantining guests.

Freight drivers coming into the ACT from a hotspot (non-ACT residents) Dear (autofill)

Thank you for your application dated (<u>autofill</u>) requesting an exemption under the Public Health (COVID-19 Interstate Travellers) Emergency Direction 2020 to enter the ACT on (<u>autofill</u>) as part of your work as a transit/freight operator.

The Public Health (COVID-19 Interstate Travellers) Emergency Direction 2020 specifically exempts all transits through the Australian Capital Territory by road for business or freight purposes.

Therefore, under the Direction, freight, transport and trucking companies and drivers do not need to apply for an exemption to enter the ACT.

The preference would be that companies who are transiting through the ACT restrict their activity while in the ACT to the delivery or receipt of goods only.

Drivers must observe the following:

- No passengers allowed to travel unless they are freight workers
- Only exit vehicle to access rest stop facilities, refuelling, accommodation, activities directly related to the delivery or loading of freight or to meet requirement regulated activities (eg whs or fatigue management)
- Follow all COVID-19 related instructions from employees at any premises accessed.
- Employ or introduce non contact receipt and collection processes
- Wash or sanitise hands at all appropriate times, but especially at entry to a premises and prior to leaving.
- Maintain appropriate social distancing while in any premises
- During freight journeys, drivers should avoid large venues/restaurants and use roadhouse facilities wherever possible.
- Overnight stays at accommodation should only occur when necessary to fulfil fatigue requirements. Accommodation providers must apply COVID Safe protocols and cleaning procedures to minimise risk. Drivers not permitted to use common areas in accommodation premises and adhere to physical distancing and limit contacts.
- PPE should be used whenever physical distancing is not possible, where directed by state or territory governments, Department of Health, SWA or where mentioned in COVID Safe Workplans.

- o If displaying symptoms of illness such as a fever, cough, or sore throat do not enter a premises, advise employer, seek medical assistance, self isolate until medical assistance is received. Do not continue on journey.
- Keep good records of where you have been including dates and times.

If drivers intend to stay for longer than a one-night rest stop they must apply for an exemption.





Public health preparedness and response

Clusters and high-risk settings

LOCALLY ACQUIRED CASES

There are 15 new cases reported today who acquired COVID-19 locally. 2 of the 15 remain under investigation.

AVALON CLUSTER

13 of the locally acquired cases reported today are linked to the cluster. There are now 83 cases linked to this cluster. The source of the cluster remains under investigation. The cases attended multiple venues and contact tracing continues.

There are 2 clusters of cases which have occurred outside the Northern Beaches, one at a hairdressing salon in Turramurra, and one in an office in the CBD. Both of these clusters were seeded by cases who had acquired the infection in the Northern Beaches.

JAPARA BAYVIEW GARDENS AGED CARE HOME

One case reported in the Avalon Cluster previously works at a residential aged care facility. NSW Health and Australian Government collaborating on response. No cases identified to date in residents or other staff.

SOUTH SYDNEY CASE

One case reported on 16 December is a driver who transports flight crew to and from the airport and their hotels. Close contacts are isolating.

INTERSTATE/OVERSEAS ACQUIRED

There are 8 new cases reported today who acquired COVID-19 overseas.

Policy

Key updates

On 20 December 2020, the Premier announced:

- Residents across greater Sydney should limit unnecessary activity.
- The following restrictions will tonight be introduced from 11:59pm, Sunday 20 December 2020 for the greater Sydney region and the Central Coast, Illawarra-Shoalhaven, and Nepean Blue Mountains:
 - Household gatherings will be limited to 10 visitors (until 11:59pm Wednesday 23 December).
 - The one person per four square metre rule will be re-introduced for all indoor settings including hospitality venues and places of worship.
 - A cap of 300 people will apply for hospitality venues and places of worship.
 - Singing and chanting at indoor venues will not be allowed
 - Dancefloors will not be permitted, except for weddings, when a maximum of 20 from the bridal party will be permitted.
- NSW Health strongly encourages people to wear face masks indoors.

The <u>Public Health</u> (COVID-19 Self Isolation) Order (No 5) 2020 repeals and remakes the Public Health (COVID-19 Self-Isolation) Order (No 4) 2020 (No 4 Order). The No 5 Order requires self-isolation of persons diagnosed with COVID-19 and persons identified as close contacts of cases. Any obligation to self-isolate under the No 4 Order continues in effect.

The No 5 Order is substantially the same as the No 4 Order subject to:

- the <u>NSW Health Self-Isolation guidelines</u> (that persons who are required to self-isolate must comply with) have been updated
- the No 5 Order requires compliance with the guidelines which may change from time to time.

The <u>Public Health (COVID-19 Northern Beaches) Order 2020</u> contains directions on staying at home, entering the Northern Beaches, public gatherings, exempted gatherings and places that are closed. The Order commenced at 5.02 pm on 19 December and is repealed at the end of 23 December 2020.

A person must not be away from their place of residence or short-term accommodation in the Northern Beaches, without a reasonable excuse. A reasonable excuse includes the need to do the following activities:

- 1. To obtain food or other goods or services for the personal needs of the person's household, or other household purposes (including for pets) or for vulnerable persons
- 2. To travel for work purposes, if the person cannot work from home, and to travel to and from a school or other educational institution
- To exercise
- 4. To obtain medical care or supplies, or to fulfil carer's responsibilities
