About Emma Thomas

Emma Thomas is a PhD candidate at the University of Melbourne (School of Global and Population Health) and an NHMRC Postgraduate Scholar. Her PhD investigates how a cardiac rehabilitation registry could be established in Victoria to enable systematic monitoring of cardiac rehabilitation programs and patient outcomes.

Additionally, she has worked with Deakin University and the Heart Foundation to develop a standardised cardiac rehabilitation program outline which aims to reduce the variability in program delivery. She also sits on a National Taskforce for the development of Australian cardiac rehabilitation quality indicators.

Emma's research more broadly has focused on the prevention of cardiovascular disease and implementation science. In particular, she is interested in scaling-up effective interventions to reach larger populations. Prior to commencing her PhD, Emma worked at the University of Oxford at the World Health Organisation Collaborating Centre on Population Approaches for Non-Communicable Disease Prevention and the University of Queensland in a centre for research excellence in stroke rehabilitation. This work builds on previous clinical experience in the area of stroke rehabilitation as a speech pathologist.

Emma now works as a Senior Coordinator for Heart Health at the Heart Foundation (QLD).
