National Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers

1 INTRODUCTION

The survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers was conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) throughout Australia from 16 March to 29 May 1998. The survey collected information about three population groups:

- people with a disability;
- older people; and
- people who provide assistance to others because of their disabilities.

Interactions and interdependence create a society. The individual, the family and the community provide mutual support, with individuals dependent on others at various stages of life. Disability and ageing are factors that may influence a person's need for support or assistance. Caring is a response to a need arising in the family or community, and contributes to the cohesion of a society. Relatives and friends provide a major part of the assistance needed. Support from government, commercial and private non-profit sources also helps to provide part of this assistance.

This publication presents a comparison of results from the published tables (ABS Cat. no: 4430.0) from the survey and the equivalent tables for the ACT which were obtained by the Epidemiology unit of the ACT Department of Health and Community Care. Due to the small sample size allocated to the ACT (1880 people), some data contained large relative standard error and cannot be used.

2 DISABILITY

Disability in the context of health experience: the World Health Organisation (WHO) defines disability as any restriction or lack (resulting from an impairment) of ability to perform an action in the manner or within the range considered normal for a human being.

In 1998, 53,100 people (17.2 % of the population) in the ACT had a disability. Another similar number of people (53,000) had an impairment or long-term condition which restricted their daily activities. Of those with a disability, 82.5 percent (or 14.2 % of population) experienced specific restrictions in core activities (including restrictions in schooling or employment). Nationally, 19.3 percent of the population had a disability and 87.4 percent of persons with a disability (or 16.9 % of population) experienced specific restriction in core activities. However, when age standardised adjustments are made to account for differences in age distributions, the variation in disability rates decreased.



The proportion of males and females with a disability in the ACT was quite different to the national average. In 1998, 16.6 percent of males and 17.7 percent of females in the ACT had a disability, while 19.6 percent of males and 19.0 percent of females in Australia had a disability. The proportion of males with a disability in the ACT was one percent less than the proportion of females with a disability. However, the proportion of males with a disability in Australia was 0.6 percent higher than those of the females (refer Table 1 in the Appendix).

The ABS grouped persons with a disability into the following groups: profound or severe (6.1 % of the national population), moderate (3.5%), or mild (5.5 %), depending on the level of assistance needed or difficulty experienced and restriction in core activities. The ACT has a lower percentage (5.4 %, 2.7 % and 4.2 % respectively) of persons with a disability in all groups compared to the national average (refer Table 2 in the Appendix).

Nationally, the rate of disability increased with age, from 4 percent for infants aged between 0-4 years to 84 percent for those aged 85 and over. While the pattern of increase in most of the ACT adult age groups between 15 to 64 was similar to the national average, the percentage of disability in the ACT for age group 5-14, 65-74 and 75-84 were higher than the national averages. On the other hand, the infants (0-4) and the oldest (85+) age groups

in the ACT were lower than the national average (refer Table 3 in the Appendix). It is interesting to note that while the percentage of disability for the infants age group (0.8 %) in the ACT was much lower than the national average (3.7 %), the age group (5-14) in the ACT (13 %) was much higher than the national average (9.5 %).



2.1 Underlying Health Conditions

Disability usually exists as a consequence of disease, disorder or injury. In 1998, 86.4 percent of the ACT persons with a disability (nationally 85.3 %) experienced physical conditions, including musculoskeletal disorders such as arthritis. However, 13.6 percent (nationally 14.6 %) of people with a disability identified a mental or behavioural disorder as their main condition (refer Table 10 in the Appendix). There were 6 times more disabled persons in the ACT with a physical condition than those with mental and behavioural disorders. Most people with a profound or severe core activity restriction had a physical disorder as their main condition (83.7 % in the ACT and 78.0 % nationally). However, people whose main condition was a mental or behavioural disorder were more likely to be profoundly or severely restricted (37.5 %) than those with a physical condition (30.3 %). The national figures were 47 percent physical compared with 29 percent mental.






Figure 3 compares the percentages of the ACT and Australian persons with a disability restriction by status for physical condition and figures 4 compares the mental and behavioural disorders condition. As a whole, the ACT persons with a disability has a lower percentage of activity restriction than the national average.

2.2 Assistance for Persons with a Disability

In 1998, 57.1 percent of the 51,700 people in the ACT with a disability living in households needed assistance to move around or go out, to shower or dress, prepare meals, perform housework, carry out light property maintenance, complete paperwork, or to communicate. The same percentage was recorded nationally (refer Table 12 in the Appendix).

Most people in need of assistance received some help, 54.6 percent (nationally 64.6 %) had their needs fully met and 40.7 percent (nationally 32.3 %) partly met. On the other hand, there were 5.1 percent (nationally 4.0 %) who felt their needs were not met at all.

The proportion of people receiving help varied with the severity of restriction. People with profound or severe restriction who needed assistance were likely to receive help. However, they were less likely to have their needs fully met than those with milder restriction. When disabled person's need for assistance in the ACT was compared with the national average, the ACT was behind the national average (in percentage term) in all category of restrictions for "assistance met fully". Conversely, the ACT was above national average in all category of restrictions in the "assistance met partly". Figure 5 shows the comparison between the ACT and Australia. The sample size in the ACT for "assistance not met at all" was too small to make a meaningful comparison.



2.3 Use of aids or equipment

29,400 (or 55.4 %) of persons with a disability in the ACT used some sort of aid or equipment. These included self-care aids (8.1 % or 4,300), mobility aids (13.7 % or 7,300), communication aids (14.9 % or 7,900), meal preparation (2.8 % or 1,500) and medical aids (35 % or 18,600) (refer Table 14 in the appendix). The national comparisons are shown in Figure 6. It is interesting to note the percentage for the ACT persons with a disability using medical aids or equipment (35%) is much higher than the national average (27%).



2.4 Transport

In 1998, 92 percent of the ACT people with a disability were able to use public transport compared with 87 percent nationally. Furthermore, only 26 percent of the disabled persons in the Territory have difficulty using public transport compared with 31 percent nationally (refer Table 16 in the Appendix). However, the percentage of disabled persons in the ACT taking public transport (40 %) was less than the national average (47 %) and a higher proportion of disabled persons in the ACT drove motor vehicles in their day to day activities (refer Tables 17 & 18 in the Appendix). More than half of the disabled persons aged 17 and over in the ACT drove motor vehicles. Nearly all disabled persons in the ACT held a current drivers licence drive.

Disabled persons - mode of transport



2.5 Social and Economic Indicators

The financial situation for persons with a disability (in age groups 15 - 64) in the ACT were much better than the national average (refer Table 19 in the Appendix). 54 percent of them were in the well off (4th and 5th income quintile) groups, compared with only 29 percent nationally. Furthermore, the financial situation for persons with no disability in the ACT was also better off, 55 percent of the Territory's population was in the well off groups (4th and 5th quintiles) compared with only 44 percent nationally.

Persons (aged 15 - 64) total weekly cash income



In 1998, 66 percent of persons in the ACT with a disability owned their dwelling compared with 62 percent nationally and 60 percent for persons with no disability in the ACT.

People in the ACT have a high level of standard education. It is interesting to note that people with a disability in the ACT have even higher education standards. In 1998, 58 percent of people with a disability in the ACT have post school education qualifications compared with only 43 percent in Australia and 53 percent for people with no disability in the ACT. Nearly half of those (23 %) with post school education were graduates. This high standard of education for people with a disability in the ACT was also reflected in the secondary schooling level, 46 percent of them completed year 12 compared with only 27 percent nationally.

People in the ACT have better employment prospects (or lower unemployment rate). Again, people with a disability in the ACT have even better employment prospects. The unemployment rate for people with a disability in the ACT was only 6.6 percent in 1998, compared with 11.5 percent in Australia and 7.0 percent for people with no disability in the ACT.

In the ACT, 13.1 percent of employed persons have a disability, including 10.1 percent who have specific restrictions. Nationally, 11.3 percent of employed persons have a disability, including 9.0 percent with specific restrictions (refer Table 20 in the Appendix).

In 1998, of those persons with a disability stating sectors of employment, 76 percent worked in the government sectors compared with only 20 percent nationally. Unfortunately, 28 percent of the responses did not state employment status or sector, which makes accurate analysis difficult (refer Table 21 in the Appendix).

3 OLDER PEOPLE (aged 65 and over)

In 1998, the ACT had 23,600 (7.6 %) people aged 65 and over including 9,400 (3.0 %) who were aged 75 and over. The vast majority lived in private dwellings (21,000 or 89 %), while the rest lived in cared accommodation such as nursing homes, aged care hostels, retirement villages and boarding houses. Nationally, Australia has 12.2 percent (2.3 million) of people aged 65 and over, including nearly one million (5.2 %) aged 75 and older. The ACT has a younger population, i.e. lower percentage of old people (refer Table 1 in the Appendix).

3.1 Older persons with a disability

During 1998, 14,000 (59 %) older people in the ACT had a disability, including 12,600 (53 %) who had a selected restriction (refer Table 8 in the Appendix). Nationally, it was 54 percent and 49 percent respectively. Similar to the national average, most of the older persons with a disability lived in a private dwelling (84 %). Unfortunately the ACT sample size for older persons living in the cared accommodation was too small for analysis.

3.2 Older persons - need for assistance

During 1998, 14,000 or 60 percent (Australia 54 %) of the ACT older persons had a disability. 56 percent of these older persons with a disability needed help with their personal activities (Australia 52 %). The assistance of personal activities for older persons included health care (44 %), mobility (37 %) and self care (21 %) (refer Table 23 in the Appendix).

When all older persons (included those with no disability) in the ACT were considered, 52 present (Australia 46 %) of them needed assistance with at least one activity. These included 36 percent of older persons needed help for property maintenance (Australia 28 %), 20 percent for housework (Australia 18 %) and 20 percent for transport (Australia also 20 %).

Older people's need for assistance with everyday activities increased with age regardless of whether or not they had a disability. However, the percentage of need for assistance in each older people age group in the ACT was quite different from the Australian average. The 75-84 age group in the ACT needed more assistance than the national average, but persons aged 85 and over in the ACT had a slightly lower need for assistance than nationally (refer to Figure 9).

In 1998, 62 percent of the assistance needed by ACT older persons was fully met, compared with 67 percent nationally. On the other hand, 37 percent of the older persons in the ACT felt their need for assistance was not fully met or not met at all (refer Table 24 in the Appendix).

(percentage of people in the same age group)



3.3 Older persons (principle source of income) median weekly income

The ACT older persons (median) weekly income (\$240) was a third higher than the national average.(\$180) (refer Table 26 in the appendix). Furthermore, the median weekly income for the older persons with a disability in the ACT (\$470) was 2.6 times higher than the national average (\$180) (refer Figure 10). It is interesting to note that the ACT males older person weekly income was 40 percent more than the females (\$210), while there was only 5 percent different in the national average (males = \$190 and females = \$180).





Furthermore, the median weekly income for ACT older males with a disability was more than double that of those without a disability. On the other hand, older females with a disability had a weekly income 17 percent less than those without a disability.

According to the ABS, the ACT sample size for the males in the age group 65 and over was 46 (27 with a disability and 19 without). Hence, the number supporting the income source items in the income table was very small and need to be treated with caution.

3.4 Older persons community participation




Figure 11 **Percentage of older persons - community participation**

During the three months prior to the Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers (SDAC) in 1998, 92 percent of the older persons living in the ACT participated in community activities outside their homes (refer Table 27 in the Appendix). This included visiting family or friends (84 %), going to a restaurant or club (69 %), attending church activities (39 %), and voluntary activities (25 %). 97 percent of the older persons in the ACT also participated in community activities at home. This included being visited by family or friends (90 %), telephone conversations with friends (94 %), voluntary work (20 %), and craftwork (16 %). Figure 11 and 12 shows the percentage of community participation for older persons in the ACT and Australia. It is interesting to note that the ACT older persons were more outgoing than the average Australian older person, especially in performing arts group activities (22 % versus 5 %) and attended church activities (39 % versus 30 %).

Percentage of older persons - community participation



4 CARERS

A carer is a person of any age who provides any informal assistance, in terms of help or supervision, to persons with disabilities or long term conditions, or persons who are elderly. In 1998, there were 43,100 persons in the ACT who provided some assistance to those who needed help because of disability or ageing. Both males (20,200) and females (23,000) were well represented as carers, although the majority of these were female (53 %).

4.1 Providers of assistance

Of those providing some assistance, 18,700 (43 %) were in the 35-54 age range when caring responsibilities may involve children, partners and ageing parents. A further 4,300 were children under 18 and a similar number were people aged 65 and over (Figure 13). Carers in the ACT represent 14.0 percent of the population compared with 12.6 percent nationally. However, 88 percent of the ACT carers were not primary carers compared with 80 percent nationally (refer Table 28 in the Appendix).



4.2 Primary carers

Primary carers are those who provide the greatest amount of informal assistance with personal activities to a person with a disability and therefore caring plays a major part in their lives. In 1998, 12 percent (or 5,200) of all people providing assistance were primary carers, and most of these (82 %) were female. The sample of the primary carers in the ACT was too small for further analysis.

4.3 Carer - Social and Economic Indicators

Most of the principal sources of cash income for ACT carers were wages / salaries (57 %) or government pension / allowance (20 %). Comparatively, average Australian carers were more reliant on government pension or allowances (41 %) than wages or salaries (29 %).

The financial situation for the ACT carers (age 15 years and over, living in households) was better than the national average (refer Table 30 in the Appendix). 49 percent of them were in the well off (4th and 5th income quintile) groups compared with only 30 percent in Australia (figure 14).

Persons (age 15 years and over, living in households) total cash income




The employment situation for ACT carers in 1998 was also better than the national average. 67 percent of the ACT carers were employed compared with 50 percent nationally. Only 3.2 percent of ACT carers were looking for work (unemployed) compared with 6.0 percent in Australia.

In 1998, 63 percent of the carers in the ACT owned their dwelling compared with 69 percent nationally and 61 percent for the ACT non-carers. Furthermore, only 44 percent of the ACT carers living in dwellings were without mortgage compared with 56 percent nationally.
