7. Supplier's Personnel

The Supplier must, in providing the Supplies:

8. Non-disclosure of Territory Information

Minister's question/s:

On 5 November the Minister asked if funding figures provided (GCB18/567) for the Woden Community Service (WCS) were solely for hoarding (services), and if so, to please explain the difference between the ACT Health funding currently provided to WCS and the additional \$250,000 forecast as required for dedicated NGO hoarding services.

ACT Health's response:

Woden Community Service (WCS)

WCS participated on the Hoarding Case Management Group (HCMG) from the group's inception in 2015. The WCS initially participated as part of their existing role in providing Supportive Tenancy Services (STS) to the community. STS is funded with support of various sources including the Federal Government and the ACT Government, Community Services Directorate (CSD). STS are provided by WCS to assist people whose tenancy is at risk or who are facing barriers in establishing a private tenancy. The WCS provided limited case management support to hoarding cases managed by the HCMG. However, in February 2018 the WCS formally advised they would withdraw from the HCMG as they considered their ongoing participation was unsustainable.

Current ACT Health Funding of WCS

ACT Health has a two current Service Funding Agreements (SFA) with the WCS, both administered by the Policy, Partnerships and Programs Division. The SFA's include:

- A Community Assistance and Support Program (CASP), with total funding in 2018-2019 \$248,659.00 GST exclusive; and
- 2. Adult Step Up / Step Down Intensive Transitional Outreach Support (SUSD), with total funding in 2018-2019 of \$941,536.00 GST exclusive.

The CASP provides a range of basic, low intensity home and community based services for people aged under 65 who have a condition that affects their ability to carry out activities of daily living.

UNCLASSIFIED

The SUSD provides short term (three months) intensive outreach for people aged 18-64 suffering sub-acute mental illness and is a partnership program with Mental Health, Justice Health, Alcohol and Drug Clinical Services. The program also offers users after hour's case management.

While individual severe hoarding cases may seek out (or be offered) services from the STS, CASP or SUSD programs, the WCS is not currently funded by any agency for the dedicated management of hoarding cases.

Hoarding Advocacy Support Services - Ongoing Funding

The ACT Health Directorate has secured internal funding for NGO Hoarding Advocacy Support Service (HASS) until the end of the 2018-2019 financial year to support the management of severe hoarding and squalor cases in the ACT. A procurement process for HASS is currently underway.

The continuation of this funding is dependent on success of a budget bid for 2019/2020 which will seek ongoing funding for this purpose. The HPS has developed a budget bid on behalf of the HCMG to ensure ongoing NGO support services and a Whole of Government approach to hoarding.





- The HCMG was formed in 2015 and comprises representatives from government and non-government agencies that have a range of legislative functions, services and resources to manage cases involving hoarding-like behaviour.
- As the summer months can often see an exacerbation of hoarding conditions, ACT Health is currently in the process of establishing a Hoarding Advocacy Support Services (HASS) trial.
- The HASS trial will be provided by a non-government organisation (NGO) who will use a case management approach to engage with individuals and help to connect them with the levels of support they need. These support services may include mental health and aged care support and facilitating the provision of domestic services (i.e. cleaners, gardeners).
- It is envisaged that <u>an</u>-NGO provision of HASS would both support and complement the existing management of severe and complex cases of hoarding and squalor in the ACT community that is facilitated through the HCMG.
- NGOs are often able to engage with individuals and provide levels of support in a way that government agencies operating in a regulatory environment cannot.
- ACT Health is currently procuring for the trial, which is expected to commence in January 2019.
 As part of this, ACT Health is currently undertaking a procurement process for the implementation

- The HASS procurement process is seeking to establish effective community partnerships between the individuals, government regulators, government support services and community support services to tackle a complex social issue.

Current ACT Health Funding of WCS

ACT Health has a two current Service Funding Agreements (SFA) with the WCS, both administered by the Policy, Partnerships and Programs Division. The SFA's include:

- A Community Assistance and Support Program (CASP), with total funding in 2018-2019 \$248,659.00 GST exclusive; and
- 2. Adult Step Up / Step Down Intensive Transitional Outreach Support (SUSD), with total funding in 2018-2019 of \$941,536.00 GST exclusive.

The CASP provides a range of basic, low intensity home and community based services for people aged under 65 who have a condition that affects their ability to carry out activities of daily living.

The SUSD provides short term (three months) intensive outreach for people aged 18-64 suffering sub-acute mental illness and is a partnership program with Mental Health, Justice Health, Alcohol and Drug Clinical Services. The program also offers users after hour's case management.

While individual severe hoarding cases may seek out (or be offered) services from CASP or SUSD programs, the WCS is not currently funded by any agency for the dedicated management of hoarding cases.

Full text of advice received from Policy, Partnerships and Programs contract team is below. Woden Community Services and the ACT Health Directorate have two Service Funding Agreements as detailed below:

- Community Assistance and Support Program (CASP), has a total funding in 2018-2019 is \$248,659.00 GST exclusive (SFA 2015.27438.410).
- CASP provides home and community based services to the Target Group, that respond to
 the needs of the individual in a holistic manner and take into account the overall priority of
 service provision within a limited budget. Examples of support may include:
 - Client assessment and care coordination
 - Counselling/support, information and advocacy for the client or their carer/family
 - Domestic assistance
 - Personal care
 - Goods and equipment
 - Home maintenance and minor modifications, for example hand rails
 - Meal services
 - Social support
 - Formal linen services

- Medical transport
- Adult Step Up / Step Down Intensive Transitional Outreach Support (SUSD), has a total funding in 2018-2019 is \$941,536.00 GST exclusive (SFA 2015.27504.560).
- The SUSD program provides short term (three months) for intensive outreach for mental health consumers suffering sub-acute mental illness and is a partnership program with Mental Health, Justice Health, Alcohol and Drug Clinical Services. The program offers users after hours case management to people aged 18-64 years old who are suffering from mental illness."

The Requirement

Description of Requirement:	Provision of time limited, hoarding advocacy support services (HASS) to clients experiencing severe complex hoarding and squalor issues. The HASS would support and complement the existing ACT Government management of severe and complex cases of hoarding and squalor in the ACT community, currently overseen by the multi-agency Hoarding Case Management Group (HCMG).
	The key focus of the provision of targeted HASS case management is working with, and advocating for, clients to improve their particular hoarding circumstance and to provide effective liaison between the individuals, government regulators, government support services and community support services.

Item **Details** The HASS would be delivered to severe and complex hoarding cases managed by the HCMG during the first half of 2019 (from January to June). As of October 2018, there were six such cases being managed by the HCMG. HASS would include, but not be limited to: 1. building relationships with severe hoarding clients; acting as a case manager for severe hoarding clients managed by the HCMG (in collaboration with the relevant lead government agency); 3. providing targeted counselling, social and advocacy support to clients; facilitating the provision of domestic services (such as the sub-contracting of cleaners or gardeners); assisting the client access and navigate existing supports, such as mental health teams and My Aged Care; and providing primary day-to-day liaison between the hoarder and the regulator. The provision of HASS case management would align with the ACT Government commitment to better homes, better communities and better suburbs, by seeking to improve living conditions and urban amenity for those affected by severe and complex hoarding and squalor. The provision of HASS case management would also align with the ACT Government commitment to build inclusion, equality and fairness in our community, by supporting the equal and fair treatment of those affected by hoarding and their neighbours, in the ACT Government's response to, and management of, hoarding. It is anticipated that HASS would make ongoing investments in regulatory interventions more cost effective due to improved outcomes and ongoing support to minimise relapse. **Evaluation** The efficacy of the HASS case management model will be self-evaluated by the provider and by the HCMG. Evaluation would include the presentation of evidence that the delivery of HASS has, on balance, directly or indirectly contributed to: increased client amenity, wellbeing and community engagement; decreased hoarding activity by the client (a measurable reduction in squalor, public health and public safety risks); decreased interventions required by the regulator; and decreased number of related complaints received from the public. It is possible that longer term HASS services will be sought by the ACT Government, pending positive evaluation of this initial HASS period (see delivery information). Background Information: The ACT Government is called upon to address a small number of cases of severe hoarding and squalor in the ACT. Severe hoarding and squalor has profound impacts on the responsible individual, such as posing public health and safety risks. It also impacts on neighbours, including diminishing urban amenity and enjoyment of their home and property. Numerous ACT Government directorates have legislative levers available to engage with hoarding and domestic squalor issues. In 2015, HCMG was established to enhance the whole-of-government approach to the management of severe and complex hoarding and domestic squalor cases. The HCMG acknowledges that each case of severe hoarding is different and there is no single regulatory approach that will effectively resolve all cases. Severe and complex cases require the ongoing involvement of several agencies at any given time. An individual living with a severe hoarding or squalor circumstance often has competing health and social issues which require multidisciplinary interventions and a cross-sector approach to achieve optimal stability and better outcomes, including connecting with their community. Individuals can be unreceptive to support offered by the government, who are seen primarily in the role of regulator. Optimal resolution of complex hoarding cases may require regulatory action in conjunction with non-government support and case management. Ongoing HASS may also decrease the frequency of regulatory action. It is anticipated that HASS case management provided by a non-government organisation (NGO) would positively
