Models of Care Review for the Surgical Procedures, Interventions Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre project

Firstly, I wanted to take this opportunity to thank you and your team for the support in developing the successful SPIRE Centre business case for Government's consideration. The Government's favourable consideration to the CHS and ACT Health preferred option is a testament to our collaborative approach being taken on the Government's major infrastructure projects. To this end, one of the next important steps for the project is the confirmation of CHS Models of Care for the SPIRE Centre functions.

In February 2018, ACT Health engaged Healthcare Management Advisors (HMA) to develop draft Models of Care, Health Planning Unit (HPU) Briefs and a draft schedule of accommodation for the SPIRE Centre (based on a previous proposed location where the current helipad is located). As part of this work, extensive engagement was undertaken with clinical stakeholders between February and April 2018, including with representatives from the Emergency Department, Intensive Care Unit, Perioperative Services, and Cardiology. A combined Model of Care and Health Planning Unit brief was developed for the Surgical Inpatient Unit.

The HMA consultancy concluded in April 2018, however the Models of Care did not progress to final endorsement due to further planning being undertaken for the BHSP throughout 2018 to refine the infrastructure solution for SPIRE and other major infrastructure projects. Through the establishment of Canberra Health Services (CHS) and the ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD), the ownership of Models of Care reside with CHS, while responsibility for HPU briefs and major project infrastructure planning documents reside with the ACTHD.

To inform next stages of design and main contractor procurement for SPIRE, the project team is required to develop an integrated Service Delivery Plan and functional brief. It is essential that up-to-date Models of Care and HPU Briefs for SPIRE inform the development of these key project planning documents.

To this end, I am seeking your support to ensure that the Models of Care are reviewed and validated by CHS in the context of the new site location, the refined infrastructure scope, and completed fifty per cent proof of concept design.

Consistent with the 2018 process, I would suggest that Executive Directors and Clinical Directors/ Clinical Leadership review these Models of Care with support from the SPIRE Centre Project team; however, I note that the review process is at your discretion.

Notwithstanding the previous clinical engagement on the draft Models of Care, I anticipate that there may be some clinical areas where you or your executive and clinical staff may wish to take a new approach to delivery and therefore seek to substantially amend the Models of Care. I ask that where such substantial changes are suggested that the existing Models of Care be validated against the current approach, to inform design procurement processes, and the areas for change are then highlighted for further development in the design process. The procurement process for the principal design consultant will then include as a first milestone the amendment of Models of Care consistent with CHS feedback and a series of workshops and benchmarking activities.

Following validation of the Models of Care, alignment of HPU briefs and the integration into a Service Delivery Plan, the project will progress into the next stage of design. As part of the development of a Preliminary Sketch Plan, ACT Health will seek consultant support to work with the project team and CHS clinical representatives to explore identified opportunities for innovation and improved operational efficiency in the design of the SPIRE Centre.

I am also recommending that SPIRE specific models of service delivery are developed for sterilising services and the new loading dock to ensure the Service Delivery Plan for SPIRE is comprehensive. To this end, we will also seek support through the engagement of the principal consultant to develop with CHS stakeholders a detailed model of service delivery, as well as confirmation of the schedules of accommodation for these two areas.

Based on current programming advice from Infrastructure Finance and Capital Works, HPU briefs for the SPIRE project and a draft Service Delivery Plan is due for draft finalisation toward the second half of 2019. I am seeking your support to review and validate the CHS Models of Care by the end of June 2019.

In line with recent clinical engagement processes, the ACTHD facility planning and project representatives are available to support the Model of Care review and validation process with CHS.

The new Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre will future-proof hospital facilities for Canberra and our region by transforming the acute health services delivered at The Canberra Hospital.

The SPIRE Centre will deliver 114 Emergency Department treatment spaces – 39 more than are currently available at The Canberra Hospital, as well as 60 ICU beds – doubling the number currently available.

SPIRE will include four new paediatric ICU beds and a family zone to provide support services for families who have children in the ICU.

It will also deliver 22 new state-of-the-art operating theatres – nine more than are currently available, including hybrid theatres and interventional radiology theatres that will support the most advanced medical technology and techniques in caring for Canberrans.

Chief Minister Andrew Barr said the delivery of SPIRE forms part of the ACT Government's plan to future-proof Canberra's healthcare system to meet ongoing growth in demand for high quality, free public healthcare.

"The SPIRE Centre was one of our most significant commitments at the 2016 election. We are getting on with delivering it because we understand how important it is to be building now to meet Canberra's healthcare needs into the future."

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Meegan Fitzharris said the original scope of the SPIRE Centre has been expanded as a result of consultation with the clinical workforce and we look forward to that continuing as Canberra Health Services (CHS) works through the finer details.

"ACT Health and CHS have engaged with clinicians extensively and we've listened," Minister Fitzharris said.

"The SPIRE Centre we are announcing today will be bigger and better than first planned and will provide the best outcomes for our community and for our current and future health workforce.

"The best health systems and patient outcomes only occur when universities and health services work closely together.



The Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre is a major health infrastructure project for Canberra and the surrounding region.

The SPIRE Centre will increase our capacity to deliver acute, hospital-based health care in a modern, purpose-built facility. It will see more than \$500 million invested in the Canberra Hospital campus.

Through funding in the 2017-18 and 2018-19 ACT Budgets, the first stages of the SPIRE project have included early planning and feasibility work. As part of this process, ACT Health established a Steering Committee and worked closely with health service providers and key stakeholders to establish an agreed baseline from which effective, territory-wide service and infrastructure planning has been undertaken.

Following extensive planning and feasibility work, SPIRE will be built at the eastern end of the hospital campus.

The advice of the Steering Committee has been critical in determining the optimal location for SPIRE. The proposed location at the eastern end of the campus will minimise disruption to existing critical care services such as the emergency department and helipad, while SPIRE is constructed.

There will be significant planning and consultation going forward as we enter into the next project development stage.



Canberra Hospital's new Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency Centre will be larger and deliver more services for Canberrans as a result of ACT Government investment announced today.

SPIRE, which is the largest health infrastructure project in the ACT, will transform the Canberra Hospital campus and the acute health services delivered at the hospital and will be complemented by a new Australian National University building that will significantly boost the teaching, training and research presence on the Hospital campus.

Purpose

The SPIRE internal staging and decanting communications strategy aims to:

- provide staff with timely, accurate information regarding: the demolition of buildings
 5 and 24, and plans for relocation of services;
- · assist in preparing staff for moves to new locations; and
- promote the value of the new SPIRE Centre to staff and the Canberra community.

Achieving these aims will create the foundation for winning broad support and positive staff sentiment for the project.

'Internal' refers to Canberra Health Services staff, ACT Health staff, ANU Medical School staff working in building 5, and the Health Minister's Office.

A separate, external communications plan has been developed for the SPIRE project. The plan covers external communications and stakeholder engagement through all phases of the SPIRE project, including demolition of buildings 5 and 24 and site preparation.

Background

Territory-wide Health Services Framework

ACT Health has undertaken Territory-wide health services planning to develop an evidence-based foundation for major health infrastructure decision making. Planning work is conducted in close consultation with clinical, nursing and allied health staff, with opportunities for further engagement from non-government organisations and community-based organisations.

As part of this planning work, ACT Health has developed a Territory-wide Health Services Framework. The Framework is a high-level strategic plan that establishes the overarching principles to guide the development and redesign of health care services across the Territory over the next decade.

The ACT Government's 10-year Health Plan also provides the foundation for key infrastructure investments, to continue to build an innovative and world-class health system for the ACT. The Plan recognises the importance of keeping Canberrans healthy and emphasises the need to plan ahead and invest, to ensure our health system is able to meet demand in an efficient, sustainable and innovative way.

The new Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency Centre (SPIRE) is a \$600 million investment in Canberra's health infrastructure.

The new Centre will deliver:

- a boost to the number of operating theatres delivering more capacity for elective and emergency surgery
- · more inpatient beds and a larger intensive care unit
- · a coronary care unit for people requiring high level care for heart conditions
- · state-of-the-art surgical, procedural and imaging facilities
- a significantly expanded ED, enabling capacity for emergency health care for women and children.

Site preparation: demolition of buildings 5 and 24

The location for the SPIRE development was announced by the ACT Health Minister, Meegan Fitzharris, 12 December 2018. The site encompasses land on which Canberra Hospital buildings 5 and 24 are currently located. Development will require the demolition of these buildings and the relocation of existing services and staff from the site. This internal communications and engagement plan details activities to be undertaken from January 2019 through to the conclusion of the demolition/site preparation phase.

Affected staff and services

SPIRE site preparation planning, decanting and demolition works will commence in January 2019. The construction site is to be cleared and ready for building works by December 2019.





Building up Canberra's health care service

Planning is underway for construction of the new Surgical Procedures, Interventional Radiology and Emergency (SPIRE) Centre.

The \$500 million state-of-the-art facility will be on the north-eastern side of the Canberra Hospital campus and will boost the territory's acute and hospital-based health care services.

The Centre will replace ageing buildings and completely renew the north-eastern end of the hospital precinct. The site will also ensure minimal disruption to critical care services, such as the Emergency Department.

Construction is expected to start in 2020 with a planned completion date set for 2023-24.



In December 2018, the location of SPIRE at the Canberra Hospital was publicly announced by Minister for Health and Wellbeing, Meegan Fitzharris. For the announcement a media doorstop style media event was held at the hospital and a new SPIRE fact sheet was developed.

ACT Health has commenced engagement with the clinical workforce on SPIRE as early design work progresses. A clinical leadership forum on SPIRE was held in November 2018 prior to the location announcement, with engagement to continue through 2019, including:

- the ongoing oversight of a Steering Committee;
- the establishment of specialist user groups to oversee the design and planning of construction works such as ICT, clinical procedures, and accessibility; and
- · ongoing communications with staff.

In addition, ACT Health will present a SPIRE information session at the Woden Valley Community Council public meeting on Wednesday 6 March. Updates throughout the life of the project will also be made available on the ACT Health website and through the Our Canberra newsletter, with the latest article on SPIRE scheduled for the March edition.



departments relocated as part of SPIRE are appropriately consulted and informed throughout.

It is expected that the engagement strategy and activities will evolve as the project passes through critical milestones in design, construction, commissioning and operations. For example, in the initial design phase, ongoing consultation is being undertaken with Canberra Hospital clinical and maintenance staff in a collaborative and iterative manner to ensure that the design meets their requirements and facilitates the implementation of enhanced Models of Care and achieves operating efficiencies. This consultation is being led by key leaders in ACT Health and CHS and supported by specialist advisors as required.

As the Project continues to develop, communication and consultation will be undertaken with a broader pool of stakeholders. This will continue to include consultation with clinical and maintenance staff, but will also include other staff and users of Canberra Hospital, patients and visitors, as well as the local community in Woden and Garran, including Garran Primary School. Effective stakeholder consultation with the local community will be critical to support planning and approvals processes and to understand and address community concerns as they arise. It is anticipated that external communications activities will be coordinated by the ACT Health Communications and Media Unit, in consultation with the ACT Health Strategic Infrastructure Unit and the CHS Communications team. Communications will align with the Whole of Government Communications and Engagement Plan 2019, in which Health is a priority area.

This Chapter provides an overview of the anticipated project stakeholders and their likely areas of interest, as well as providing a summary of the communications approach.

1.2 Our stakeholders

SPIRE is a complex project, with a broad range of internal and external stakeholders, ranging from staff at Canberra Hospital, patients and visitors, through to Territory Directorates, aged care facilities, unions, health service providers and emergency services personnel.

Project stakeholders have been split into internal (i.e. within the ACT Government) and external for discussion in this Chapter.

1.3 Communication and consultation

1.3.1 Communication objectives

The communication objectives for SPIRE include the following:

- Receive clinical and other user / expert input into infrastructure planning to ensure project concepts and early designs meet health care needs and community expectations;
- Inform and engage local communities, health services staff and user groups in the infrastructure development program as it unfolds; and
- · Build positive public sentiment towards the project.

These objectives align with the ACT Government's commitment to engaging effectively with its citizens as outlined in Engaging Canberrans: A guide to community engagement.

Additionally, key projects in the BHSP, such as SPIRE, the potential future Northside Hospital scoping study and the expansion of CHWC are all closely related. Consequently, a Territory-wide approach to health services planning and communication is anticipated to be maintained for during planning and early design of each project. Further information on the key messages for Territory-wide health planning and SPIRE is set out at Appendix [x].

1.3.2 Consultation methods

Internal and external stakeholder groups will be engaged and communicated by ACT Health and CHS throughout the development of SPIRE through a series of meetings, consultations and workshops.

Communications will be developed by the ACT Health Communications and Media Unit, in consultation with ACT Health and CHS. The Executive Group Manager Strategic Infrastructure and Procurement will act as the lead spokesperson for SPIRE with support from the Deputy Director General, Director General (ACT Health), the CEO of CHS and the Minister for Health as required and at significant project milestone events.

The community will be given opportunities to provide ongoing feedback throughout the Project's development. A variety of different consultation methods will be used, including:

- Communication and engagement tools tailored for internal and external stakeholders (as set out in this Chapter)
- ACT Government's Your Say online engagement website and platform use of the latest tools
 and technologies to engage online with stakeholders and the community

The majority of this week's workshops on models of care have gone very well. However, we have encountered some discontent in the perioperative and helipad workshops that I wanted to alert you to. The key points are set out below:

Perioperative MOC Workshop - 05 September

- 1. The feeling was that 22 Operating Theatres was not enough, with suggestions that our facility covers (or will cover) a population of 1.5 million. There appears to be a presumption that all surgeries currently delivered for Canberra Hospital elsewhere would return to the CH site as a result of the SPIRE project.
- 2. The plans for the existing 13 ORs in Building 12 came up. Although it was stated that future use of this building would be determined as part of the Territory-wide clinical services plan and master planning processes, the prospect that a decision to decommissioned these may occur was a concern. (NB: the Business Case assumption was that these 13 ORs would close).
- 3. There was confusion over activity data and they want to see the data and future projections (by specialty) that had been used to determine the number of OR's. Dr Andrew Mitchell had his own surgical projections that apparently demonstrated that we will be at full capacity (with 22 theatres) on the day of opening. Dr Wendall Neilson also noted that the data would be wrong for his speciality as he had secured an additional vascular surgeon this year. It was noted that twilight surgery would not be an option to increase capacity.
- 4. The group thought the breakdown of Hybrid/IR/general was wrong and were not supportive of the governance arrangements that have been determined for the IR OR's.
- 5. For maternity, Boon Lim (O&G) and Hazel Carlisle (NICU) were strongly of the opinion that a dedicated obstetric operating theatre was needed, either in CHWC or retained in Building 12. As you know, this was a known risk with the location of SPIRE that we have discussed previously and needs to be resolved. Transfer times for a birthing mother and for critically ill infants going back to NICU are driving these concerns.
- 6. The maternity discussion prompted suggestions that all O&G and paediatric surgery stay in the current ORs post-delivery of SPIRE. The surgeons then suggested that all day surgery could be done in the Building 12 OR's with just emergency and elective multi-stay surgery to happen in SPIRE.
- 7. The group was also of the understanding that the Endoscopy Suite was also going to be co-located with the ORs in SPIRE. This is currently not provided for in the Business Case or planning for SPIRE.
- In the main, Dr Andrew Mitchell and Dr Wendall Neilson were most vocal in their concerns around the planned arrangements for SPIRE. Dr Andrew Mitchell stated that he was seeing the Minister tomorrow and that he would be informing her that there were not enough OR's and that no one had asked him to be part of the planning process.

Helipad MOC Workshop - 03 September

1. This working group remains of the view that two helipads are essential.

In both these areas we will need to discuss how we can resolve outstanding issues and agree a way forward. Although the helipad matter is fairly fundamental, we will be requiring the designs to be developed so that a second pad can be added - so even a late change on this will not be too disruptive. However, if there will be two, it would be best to resolve this now. For perioperative, the capacity issue probably boils down to what happens with Building 12. Unfortunately, the timeline for the Territory-wide clinical services plan and master planning does not help with resolving the SPIRE planning ahead of ECI tenders around March of next year.

I am happy to come over today to discuss this further, or wait until out meeting on Monday.
